Congratulations Shiv Verma FPSA, HonNEC



In Memoriam John C. Fuller, HonPSA, AFIAP, HonNEC

1942-2023



It is with great sadness that we recognize the passing of John C. Fuller, HonPSA, AFIAP, HonNEC of Brooklin, Maine (formally of Norfolk, MA) on Sunday, April 9, 2023. He leaves behind his wife Janet, five children,16 grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren. John was a retired Vice President of the Foxboro Company and a past Vice President for the Massachusetts Audubon Society. He and his wife Janet donated a large amount of property to form the Mass. Audubon Stony Brook Reservation in Norfolk, MA. John was widely respected for his long-term and far-reaching service to the photographic community, through many different services to

PSA, the New England Camera Club Council (NECCC) and multiple clubs in New England.

John was a good friend and a tireless worker on behalf of the New England photographic community as he was always willing to share his considerable general knowledge of nature, especially birds and his photographic experiences. John served as a Vice President on the NECCC Board of Directors and as Treasurer from 2001-2013. During that time, he also served as a member of the Council's Scholarship Committee. In 2010 the 65th NECCC Conference was dedicated to him and in 2013 he was made an Honorary Life Vice President on the NECCC Board, their highest Honor. His Citation read: For his tireless dedication and commitment to photography; for his outstanding achievements in photography as a valued member of the photographic community both in New England and across the nation; for his leadership and administrative endeavors in the Photographic Society of America, Stony Brook Camera Club, the Greater Lynn Photographic Association and the Massachusetts Camera Naturalists; for his outstanding service to the New England Camera Club Council as presenter, as Council Treasurer for thirteen years, and member of the Scholarship Committee; for his generous commitment of time and expertise and availability when called upon to lend a hand.

John was a founding member of the Stony Brook Camera Club, Norfolk, MA. His service to that organization and the Greater Lynn Photographic Association, Lynn, MA (GLPA) where he was past Treasurer, was recognized by being elected a life member of both organizations. John was also a member of the Massachusetts Camera Naturalists (CamNats), a by invitation only organization dedicated to nature and natural history photography.


He had an outstanding record in PSA-recognized exhibitions holding a 5-star rating in Color and Diamond Star rating in Nature. A much sought-after judge and lecturer, he judged locally at many clubs in prints and projected images, color and nature; as well as the Boston Globe Photography Contest, many interclub competitions and International Exhibitions. Over the years he presented more than 50 programs at the local club level, the NECCC Conferences and at various PSA conferences. His prints were shown in solo exhibitions at Massachusetts Audubon Society venues and in conjunction with others, his work has also been on display at various locations across New England.

A member of PSA since 1974, John had been an effective leader in PSA at its highest levels. He was one of the key participants in the establishment of the Endowment Funds of PSA and served as Lead Trustee for the PSA Endowment Funds and a member and occasional Chair of the Investment Committee of PSA for nearly two decades. John had also served the Nature Division as Chairman from 2000- 2002. He received four Editorial stars for the many articles he wrote for the PSA Journal with his images were featured on the cover of the Journal on three different occasions. In recognition of his active support of PSA and his local and regional photographic organizations, John was elected an Associate (APSA) in 1986, a Fellow (FPSA) in 1997 and in 2014, John was elected an Honorary member of PSA (HonPSA).

John and his wife Janet traveled around the world from the Arctic to the Antarctic, from Alaska to South America and from the Galapagos to Africa in search of wildlife and landscape images. His photographs from those adventures have appeared in many national publications including DeLorrne's Maine Geographic Calendar, Birder's World, WildBird, Sanctuary, the Boston Globe, and many others.

John was an innovative expert in financial matters, serving many photographic organizations such as PSA, NECCC and GLPA, as well as the Audubon Society, community clubs, church's, Masonic Lodges and the Shriners. He made significant and long-lasting contributions to the photographic community at large and will be dearly missed by all who worked with him or had their images judged by him. He will also be dearly missed as a leader, photographer and a dear friend by many who knew him well and traveled with him. There will be a "Celebration of Life" for John at the Greater Lynn Headquarters on Sunday August 20, 2023 from 1-4pm.

A Few Locations in North East Massachusetts for Nature Photography By Jacob Mosser, HonPSA, HonNEC

Here are a few of the productive areas for nature photography. Note: all areas and subjects change with the seasons, a little homework and common sense is a good thing.

1. Harold Parker State Forest, Andover/No. Andover Possible subjects: small natural scenics, birds, mushrooms, insects and wildflowers including but not limited to: lady-slippers, skunk cabbage, pinesaps, Indian-pipe and jack-in-the-pulpit, a variety of ferns.

2.Great Meadows NWR, Concord on Route 62, there is a small sign opposite Monson Road. Possible subjects: Red-winged Blackbird, Marsh Wren, Hairy Woodpecker, Great Blue Heron, Mallard, Merganser, Geese, Muskrat, Dragonflies, wildflowers including but not limited to: water lily, yellow iris, purple loosestrife, button bush, milkweed, mushrooms and insects.

3.Mass. Audubon Ipswich River Topsfield Blue Birds, Mallard ducks, Great Blue Heron, Woodpeckers, wildflowers.

Equipment used but not required: Digital SLR Camera; Cable release; flash; folding reflector; Tripod with Ball Head and Quick Release Clamp; Extender 1.4X and/pr 2X Lenses: 24-105 zoom; 70-200 zoom; 100-400 zoom; 100mm-macro; 300mm telephoto; 500mm super-telephoto Extension tube (set: 12mm, 20mm and 36mm Typical)

NECCC Individual Print Competitions to Replace Interclub Print Competitions

Interclub print competitions have always had great participation but with the onslaught of Covid and the need to have zoom meetings, there has been a steady decline in participation in these competitions. Prints need to be seen and judged in person. To this end, NECCC will be having a hiatus on the Interclub Print Competitions and extending an invitation to the printmakers for a new way and venue to enter their prints.

This will be the **NECCC individual Print Competition** to be held twice a year hosted at the Greater Lynn Photographic Association (GLPA). This year's competition dates will be Saturday, November 4, 2023 and Saturday, April 6, 2024. A printmaker can enter one Black &White (Mono) Print and one-Color Print. There is no fee to enter but prints must be mounted. Printmakers can mail their prints in with a return postage of \$15 if they want their prints returned to them (no fee if they do not want their prints returned) or they can bring them in person the morning of the judging directly to the Greater Lynn Headquarters at 564 Boston St., Lynn, MA. Bringing prints in person is a great way to stay to see the judging with hopefully brief critiques and see many amazing prints from your fellow New England Member clubs. If you attend the judging, you may also take your prints home with you at the end of the judging, except for the winning prints which will need to be photographed. Various Plaque Medal Awards for various subject matter as well as Best in Show will be given per section much like what was awarded at the past NECCC Conferences. You will be required to enter your information and print titles on an online entry form prior to submission along with a special label which will be made available to you.

This new competition will be handled by two new Vice Presidents to the NECCC Board of Directors (BOD) - Larry Dunn, MNEC and Dana Patch, MNEC. Both are very active in prints. Larry is very active print maker and the print competition chair for the GLPA Print competitions. He is also the PSA and NECC Interclub print rep., selecting prints for interclub competitions and was a worker on the NECCC Conference Print Competition Committee. Dana is also an active member of the GLPA Print Competition Committee and responsible for photographing all the winning prints as well as handling all the scoring and computerized functions that need to be done. NECCC BOD member, Art Vaughan, HonNEC will be stepping down as print competition VP but will be still involved for this first year of this individualized print competition.

Your club representatives and presidents will have all the information on this competition when all the details have been finalized emailed to them to distribute to their club members. There will also be directions and information in the Club Services Package. If you would like the details when finalized sent directly to you, please send me your email and I will put you on the list to receive them.

Bluebirds in the Backyard By Dennis Goulet

We've been feeding the birds year round at my house for over 30 years and have a wide variety of birds that are regular visitors. Although not one of birds we regularly see, this year we had bluebirds visiting our feeders for the last four weeks and at times as many as four pairs were at the feeders. The birds visit early and late in the day, and on very cold days stay much of the day. After a couple of days I set up two light stands with branches attached to provide perches in convenient locations.

I photographed the birds through the windows in the kitchen and lavette. All the photographs in this post are captured with a handheld Olympus OM-D E-M1 Mark III camera body with the Olympus M.Zuiko 300mm f/4 PRO lens, mostly at f/4 and shutter speeds as slow as 1/15 second. I photographed through the double pane window glass; although it did take some experimentation to discover which window sections offered good results.

Thoughts on Artificial Intelligence and It's Role in Camera Club Photography By Rick Cloran, HonPSA, GMPSA, HonNEC

Over the past couple of years, we have seen more and more references to Artificial Intelligence (AI) in relation to what we, as amateur photographers, do. Much of it is an advertising bit of buzz wording to make a process called machine learning sound more appealing. The latter refers to building a database of thousands of images and developing a program with one or more sophisticated algorithms to take what is data (conditions) gleaned from the images and apply that "Knowledge" to another image.

Many of the earlier implementations were things like noise reduction or sharpening. Next came the "content-aware" fill and replacement functions. The early versions of these were more an extrapolation of surrounding pixels to replace the pixel in a given area, but now we are seeing the ability to use data from one source to fill / replace data in the target image. Lately we are seeing added functionality such as the modification of faces, expressions, head position, eye and lips etc. in portrait plug-ins and filters. New functions, such as Sky Swaps, for compositing are also becoming much more "accurate" which translates to meaning the underlying masking and tuning functions are better a seamlessly blending the new sky into the target image.

The latest "bleeding edge" developments are a number of programs that use the database of images underpinning them to literally generate an image based on the keywords that are fed into the input interface. In many instances the resulting image doesn't look like a photograph, but that too is evolving. There have been several reports of AI generated images that have been entered in and which have won photographic competitions.

So, what does this mean for camera club competition and the associated interclub competitions at the Council or PSA level or even for PSA-FIAP style international exhibitions? My suggested premise is that each club, Council, Chapter, and PSA itself has to make a fundamental decision. Is it a photography organization or a digital imaging organization. That may sound a bit odd as we live in a world where virtually all of what we see is taken using digital capture devices, but at its heart, it is still photography. If the organization elects to adopt the position that it is photography based, then it may wish to avoid the ultimate debate over what is an eligible image by adopting a stance, such as the following, that is based on the premise most currently use but expands on it for greater clarity.

Image Eligibility

- Entries must originate as photographs (image-captures of objects via light sensitivity) made by the entrant on photographic emulsion or acquired digitally, through the use of a digital sensor or scanner.
- Images generated in whole or in part through computer programs or apps that use key words to derive content are not eligible.
- Images that contain elements not originated by the maker under the capture definition above, such as clip art, skies or other elements from another program or source, and images that are rephotographed from another source rather than a direct capture, are not eligible.
- All editing and alteration of the source capture or captures in the case of composites, must be done by the maker and not a third party. This does not preclude the use of plug-ins or filters within a core editing program, such as Photoshop, so long as the maker is controlling the plug-in or filter and it is not generating content that does not exist in the source image.

Guidance such as this should forestall the use of "AI" apps to generate images that do not originate as photographs while leaving makers free to use many of the sophisticated tools available to craft their images. It leaves open the question of the acceptability of functionality, such as the Neural Filters in Photoshop and other programs, to modify facial features well beyond traditional retouching, but such aspects are better left to specific rules or requirements for a given category, such as People or Portraits, within a club, Council, Chapter or PSA.


One key aspect that we cannot overlook is the implicit expectation that we and our fellow entrants operate in an ethical manner. By that I mean that we refrain from submitting images where we know we have used an application, tool, process, or whatever that results in an image that would be in violation of the core tenet of eligibility requirements, such as those outlined above. That doesn't mean we cannot use such tools to explore the creative possibilities they present. It means that we do not submit them in a venue, such as club competition, when the rules for that competition say such treatment is not allowed whether or not their use would be detectable by a judge or other viewer.

The one thing we know that is certain is that technology will continue to advance providing even more ways to enhance our creativity and refine the photographs we take and share. The key aspect in all of this is the decision at the organizational level on whether it will be a photography organization or a digital imaging organization. If the decision is photography, then some restrictions have to be in place to preserve that core tenet. Otherwise, all bets are off.

Digital Manipulation as a Photographic Competition Category by Jim Brady, MNEC

"Digital Manipulation" can have a variety of definitions. As a basic example, suppose you have an image with a distracting element. You might choose to remove that element in a way that looks very natural...as if that was the scene all along. While you have digitally manipulated the image, this is not the kind of image that most digital manipulation competitions are expecting.

I see Digital Manipulation, in terms of a competition category, as an open invitation to let loose the creative juices. Although there's plenty of creativity that can occur IN the camera, Digital Manipulation usually refers to changes made in post production. In order to make those changes, you typically need to use a photo editing app or software.

The simplest of these editing tools are apps and filters that apply certain changes to the entire image at once (like the image to the right). For example, most photo editing software includes filters for giving your image a "painterly" quality such as making your image look like a watercolor, or pen-and-ink, or oil painting. Since these are the most basic and easiest ways to digitally manipulate an image, judges would most likely expect to see these techniques used in beginner classes.

As your Digital Manipulation skills advance to Intermediate and Advanced levels, you might start using more robust tools such as masking,




layer blending, and photo composites. (A composite image is one that includes two or more photographic elements combined into one image to create a unique new image.)

As your abilities progress, your imagination becomes your only limitation. Judges would be looking for originality, technique, impact, and the story your image is presenting. It can be helpful to look at manipulated images of other photographers to get some ideas and inspiration for your own work.

There is a limit to Digital Manipulation for images in a photo competition. That limit is typically that the overall image must have a photographic origin. In other words, the image must start as a photograph. Additionally, all the elements within a composite digital image must be the photographer's own original work. Typically, you can not import images from the Internet and incorporate them into your own work. Generally, you are allowed to use filters and Photoshop brushes that produce smoke, clouds, lightning, and other tools. But you shouldn't import an image of a staircase, for example, and put that staircase into your own composite image.

On the next page are some examples of Digital Manipulations that incorporate some of the techniques mentioned above.

Winter 2023 Inter-club Print Competition

The Winter 2023 Interclub Print Competition was held on Wednesday, January 18 at the Merrimack Valley Camera Club in North Andover, Massachusetts. Although the level of club participation is up a bit from that of the 2021-2022 season, the decline over the last three years indicates that Covid is still having an impact on clubs around New England. Few are holding conventional "live" meetings, some having gone over to "Zoom only", and others are running a mix of Zoom and in-person meetings. Some have found that their former venue is no longer available. Many clubs have members that are, for good reason, uncomfortable with idea of meeting in a large group. The downturn in the number of in-person meetings has made it difficult for some clubs to collect prints for entering into NECCC competitions. Ten clubs out of the fourteen registered for competition this season submitted entries... one less than for the fall competition. It is hoped that this situation will moderate over time and the number of participating clubs can approach pre-Covid levels.

The judges for the Winter 2023 print competition were Joe Drapeau of Bedford, New Hampshire, Maureen Mathieson, MNEC of Hudson Massachusetts, , and Carl Russo.

Joe Drapeau, a longtime member of the Manchester (New Hampshire) Camera Club, has served as a judge at a number of camera clubs around New England, as well as for the NECCC. His images have appeared in a number of local and regional publications around southern New Hampshire. An avid competitor in image and print competitions, his work often appears (more often than not), in the group of award-winning entries.

Maureen Mathieson, MNEC, is a Past President of the Assabet Valley Camera Club in Hudson, Massachusetts. She had served for a number of years as a Special Service (Membership) co-Vice-President of the NECCC, as well as a member of the NECCC Conference Photo Ops Committee. An accomplished award-winning photographer, she has served as a judge for photography competitions at various New England camera clubs, as well as for NECCC and PSA.

Carl Russo, a well-known sports and event photographer, is a former member of the Lawrence Camera Club. After working for several years as a photographer for The Andover Townsman he became a staff photographer at the Lawrence Eagle-Tribune, where he has remained for over thirty years. He has won numerous photographic awards while working there and is presently serving as their night news photographer. He has judged competitions for the Merrimack Valley Camera Club and the NECCC, and when asked, is always willing to jump at another judging opportunity.

Ten clubs participated in the Winter 2023 print competition, submitting a total of 80 prints... 28 in class "A" B&W, 12 in class "B" B&W, and 40 in the color division. Seven clubs competed in class A", three in class "B", and all ten clubs in color. A total of 19 prints received awards... 6 class "A", 2 class "B" and 11 in Color. Clubs that entered less than their full allotment of four color and four B&W prints, or that missed the winter competition entirely, are encouraged to submit make-up prints along with their regular submissions for the spring competition, to be hosted by the Boston Camera Club in Brookline, Massachusetts on March 21, 2023.



Spring 2023 Inter-club Print Competition Reported by Arthur S. Vaughan, HonNEC

The Spring 2023 Interclub Print Competition was held on Tuesday, March 21st at the Boston Camera Club in Brookline, Massachusetts. The judges for the evening were Mary Boucher, MNEC... past president of the Merrimack Valley Camera Club, David Parsons, MNEC... past president of the Greater Lynn Photographic Association and Neal Skorka, past president of the South Shore Camera Club.

Mary Boucher, MNEC:

"I first got into photography in the early 80's when I wanted to take better images of my young son. So I went to Hunt's Photo to buy my first SLR and the salesman advised "buy this totally manual camera and you will learn how to be a photographer". That night I left Hunt's the proud owner of a Ricoh KR5 totally manual SLR. Of course, I hadn't a clue of what to do with it aside from a few quick tips from the salesman, so I signed up for a basic photography course at the local Y. That did it and I've been into photography ever since. Today my favorite subjects are wildlife, birds, flowers, and still life. What I love about still life is that you can create something totally unique, something no one else has made before you, and that is very satisfying. I have provided still life and glassware setups at the NECCC annual conference for many years. I am an officer in the NECCC with the honor of MNEC and a member/past president of the Merrimack Valley Camera Club in North Andover, MA.

Dave Parsons, MNEC:

Dave became interested in photography and darkroom work in the early 1960's when he joined his High School's Camera Club as a way to get out of some classes. He's a past President of the Greater Lynn Photographic Association, past Chairman of the GLPA Print Division (14) years, and competed in their Black & White Masters Class. He's also a master member of the New England Camera Club Council. He was one of a number of various artists for the Wang Center for the Performing

Arts "Arts Can Teach Program", teaching and integrating photography into the curriculum of public middle schools in Lynn, Everett and Revere. In 2004 he was awarded the Greater Lynn Photographic Association's Service Award and was made an Honorary Lifetime Vice President for "Teaching the craft of the camera, for inspiring others to explore the art of photography" and his work on the purchase and oversight of the building renovations of the GLPA's current home. He has judged prints for a number of local camera clubs and organizations as well as NECCC conventions at UMass.

Neal Skorka:

Neal has been a photographer for nearly 20 years, taking his craft from casual photographer to passionate professional. He began his photographic career as a wildlife photographer seeking to create images that show animals connecting with each other and for a quick moment with the photographer. Recently he has shifted his focus to fine art photography. Influenced by coastal photographers Alison Shaw and Steve Koppel, Neal creates images that communicate energy and movement. Neal has won many local photo competitions. He has displayed his work with the Photographic Resource Center in the "Your Work Here-2022" exhibition at the FPAC Gallery in Boston, MA. Currently his work is on display at the Woodman Shimko Gallery in Provincetown, MA, and during the summer of 2023 his ocean and beach work will be featured in the gallery. As a member of the South Shore Camera Club for 15 years, Neal has served as president and vice president of the organization, and he is currently on the board of directors of the club. He has judged competitions and hosted critique nights for the SSCC, and he enjoys working with photographers to help them create their best images.

The Boston Camera Club members who made the event run smoothly and efficiently were: Ron Abramov and Eldad Cohen who were in charge of the electronic scoring, Bert Halstead and Joan Kennedy who were the manual scorekeepers, Scott Carl, Craig Childs, Erik Ghering and Leah Ramuglia and Henry Winkleman who worked with the prints.

The council thanks the Boston Camera Club for taking on the task of hosting this competition, and greatly appreciates all the time and effort spent by its members to ensure that it ran "without a hitch". In this "post-Covid" age it's not easy to find clubs that can serve in this capacity.

Eleven clubs participated in the Spring 2023 print competition, with two submitting makeups in addition to their regular allotment. There was a total of 104 prints entered... 44 in class "A" B&W, 8 in class "B" B&W, and 52 in the color division. Nine clubs competed in class A", two in class "B", and all eleven clubs in color. A total of 19 prints received awards... 6 class "A", 2 class "B" and 11 in Color.



NECCC Inter-club Print of the Year Competition May 17, 2023 Arthur Vaughan, HonNEC

The NECCC Interclub Print of the Year competition for the 2022-2023 season was held on the evening of May 17th at the Merrimack Valley Camera Club, 72 Church St, North Andover, MA. Of a total of 45 prints eligible for entry into the competition, 43 were submitted by their makers, a turnout of 95%. Judges for this competition were Guy Lessard, John Lowe, MNEC; and Deb Venuti.

Guy Lessard has served as a judge at Merrimack Valley Camera Club and New England Camera Club Council digital image and print competitions on many occasions. He has over 40 years of professional experience as a photographer certified through the Professional Photographers of America. During that period he has captured over 1.5 million portraits (a conservative estimate). In his photography classes he has instructed over 10,000 students. Throughout his career he has worked for industry giants such as Fuji, Kodak, Nikon, and Ritz.

John Lowe, MNEC has been a member of the Merrimack Valley Camera Club for 45 years. He is also a member of the Southeast Volusia Camera Club in Florida, the Massachusetts Camera Naturalists (CamNats), plus the Photographic Society of America. He has been active in print making since 1980, and has served as a member of the New England Camera Club Council's Conference Print Competition Committee for 30 years. He has served as a judge for many camera club, NECCC, and PSA image and print competitions. His work has won numerous awards in PSA, NECCC, and Camera Club competitions.

Deb Venuti began her photographic career as an apprentis photographer at a Portrait and Wedding studio in Athens, Georgia, becoming the primary technician and second photographer. In 1984 she became manager of Alpha Studios. She has experience in commercial labs processing film, printing both black-and-white and color, and performing image restoration. She has managed two local portrait studios, Ed Eich Photography in Andover and Susan Murphy Photography in Salisbury. In 2014 she became an adjunct Professor of Photography at Merrimack College and Northern Essex Community College. Over the thirty years of her photographic career, Deb has won numerous awards and has been featured in many publications... most recently for writing and photography in the Merrimack Valley Magazine. Having been a member of the Merrimack Valley Camera Club for over 20 years, she now concentrates less on studio work and more on photojournalism and wildlife photography.

As with previous NECCC Print of the Year competitions, class "A" and "B" monochrome were judged separately. Each division's prints were previewed completely prior to scoring. At the conclusion of the competition all the prints were laid out on tables for viewing, giving attendees an opportunity to fully appreciate their quality, which is largely missed when viewing prints at a distance.

Several club members shared the various tasks involved in holding this event. Art Vaughan loaded prints into the viewing box and Jane Gifun removed them, writing the scores on the print labels, while Mary Boucher, MNEC and Traci Bodette entered scores onto the spreadsheets.

There were no ties for Print of the Year in any division. Second place (runner-up) awards were assigned to those prints that might possibly have won Print of the Year if the top award winner in each division had not been entered.




