

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

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

Obituaries

Edmund A. Woodle, FPSA, HLVP, 88, of Groton, MA passed away peacefully on February 18th at Apple Valley Center. He was a past president of the New England Camera Council Inc. and a long time valuable member of the Boston Camera Club and the Massachusetts Camera Naturalists. Ed was honored for his extensive teaching and commitment by the Photographic Society of America and the NECCC.

He became known as the "Filter Guy" for his extensive evaluation and teaching on the use of filters. He won numerous awards and had over 1500 acceptances in the Photographic Society's International color slide exhibitions. One of his proudest accomplishments was the publishing of his scenics of New England in Life Magazine.

Ed had been in the wool textile business in the years prior to his retirement. He traveled extensively and in the past several years journeyed to his favorite islands in Hawaii. A graveside memorial service will be held later this year in Groton, MA

Roslyn L. MacNish, FPSA, PPSA, HonNEC, 88, of Wethersfield, CT passed away on February 21, 2007 at Hartford Hospital. She was a long time member of the Charter Oak Photographic Society and the Massachusetts Camera Naturalists. Roslyn was a vice president of the New England Camera Club Council and she had received the honorary letters HonNEC. She was also a member of the Photographic Society of America, Inc., from which she had received the honorary designations of FPSA, PPSA.

Roslyn graduated from Bates College in Maine in 1939 and received her master's in public health through Yale University in 1941. She worked for the state of Connecticut and retired as a Research Statistician from the State Department of Health.

Roslyn was a multi-starred exhibitor and she, and her good friend Lois Clarke, traveled to all the lower 48 states and many Canadian provinces. Together they have put on over 200 programs and seminars for Audubon Societies and many photographic groups. A memorial service was held on Saturday, March 3, 2007 in Glastonbury, CT.

Frank Howd, of the Eastern Maine Camera Club, and a long time club representative to the NECCC, died March 16, 2007 as a result of an automobile accident in California. A scholarship has been set up in his memory at the Eastern Maine Camera Club.




Ron Laing's Book

Simple Digital Enhancement

It is not unusual for our travels to bring us to a beautiful location but to be faced with weather that is not so great. Such was the case with this image of the Bridge of Sighs located at St. John's College in Cambridge, England. When you have gray clouds overhead and not a hint of sunshine coming at any time soon you have the option of not taking the photograph or simply taking the picture as a record shot.

This was the case with this image in that I decided to compose it well but it was simply a record shot that I could stick into a slide show. With the advent of digtal imaging and Photoshop the door was now opened to make this image into what it should have been if the sun had actually been shining the day I captured the photograph on film.

After scanning the original slide into a digital file I opened it in Photoshop and immediately used the Shadow and Highlight function to brighten the image. I then opened another image file where I had photographed some cloud formations on a sunny day. I then switched back to the original image and then with the Magic Wand tool isolated the bland, empty sky area and inverted the selection so as to protect the rest of the image. Then, using the clone tool, I selected the cloud formation image and clicked on an area. Then I shifted to the original and painted in the clouds and blue sky and I now had a wonderful sky in my original photograph.

To finalize the image I flattened it and then turned to the Shadow and Highlight function to



adjust the brightness which then gave the effect of sunshine on the buildings and I now had the image that I had originally envisioned when I saw this scene many years ago. Try this on some of your images and I know you will like the result.

About PSA - The Photographic Society of America

Many readers of the *NECCC Bulletin* have undoubtedly seen the articles about the Photographic Society of America's Region 15 printed on these pages and noted the fact that this organization is a member of the Society. PSA is not just for clubs but is even more viable for individual members.

There are many services offered by PSA that are available to the individual and which can enhance your photographic experience. No matter what your interests there is a division in PSA that will help you advance your knowledge and give you assistance. The divisions include Color Projected Image (formerly Color Slide), Photojournalism, Nature, Pictorial Prints (color and B&W), Photo Travel, Stereo and Electronic Imaging. Information about the various divisions can be found on the PSA website – www.psa-photo.org – where you can find out about the various services available to you, as a member of the Society.

For example, the Nature Division offers an identification service that helps the nature photographer identify what they have photographed with the technical names for the subjects. Technical information is also available on how to shoot specific kinds of images and there are instructional print and slide sets that teach techniques for different subjects. Individual evaluation services are available that provide one-onone assistance on how to improve your nature images. You can also join a study group where you are a member of a group of 6 to 7 members and where your images are exchanged with the other members of the group and are commented on by an experienced nature photographer.

Most of the divisions have similar offerings to those who have interests in their particular areas of interest. The Electronic Imaging Division has, at the present time, 24 study groups similar to the Nature Division groups that are online and where those images are shared on a monthly basis and the makers state how they created the image and the other members of the group offer their own comments. You can visit the study group website at *www.psaphoto.org* and see for yourself just what these groups are all about.

Once a month you will receive the *PSA Journal* which has many articles of interest that you will find to be a great educational tool. The April 2007 issue had articles ranging from "Have a Photography Museum in your Home" to "Transition From Camera Club Shooter to Fine Art Photographer" and "Non Destructive and Editable Filter Effects". These articles show you just how wide ranging the articles are that are published each month in the *Journal*. The March issue had an upbeat article bringing a technique that was used by darkroom workers into the digital age entitled "Easy Digital"

Litho and Line." Another interesting article in that issue was on "Photographing Minor League Baseball" which can certainly apply to Little League Baseball.

There is a slide program called "This is PSA" that is available for clubs to borrow to show to their members that gives a lot of detail about the Society. This can be borrowed from the Region Director for the cost of postage. If a club has a digital projector then I have available a CD-ROM version that can be purchased for \$5.50 shipped via Priority Mail that will run on any Windows based PC. If you use a Macintosh then a DVD version can be obtained for \$7.50 including Priority Mail handling.

If you have a high speed internet connection you might want to give a try downloading the program first. There are two versions online – one is the Pictures To EXE version at a bit less than 28 megabytes and the other is the Proshow Gold version at a bit less than 22 megabytes – that you can get by FTP. I have a special website setup for this purpose and you can access it at ftp://www.psaphoto.org and use PSA-Guest as the username and CDRom as the password. Please note that the username and password are case sensitive. The DVD version is only available on disk and must be ordered for delivery by mail.

I hope by this article that I have sparked your interest in the Photographic Society of America and that you will decide to become a member. Membership forms will be available at the NECCC Conference and you can ask any PSA member about what the Society means to them. You can also join online at *www.psa-photo.org* with a secure registration form where you can use your Visa or MasterCard credit cards to pay the annual dues that are currently \$45 per year. If you prefer to mail in your application and pay by check just send me an email – *RD15@photo-ne.com* – and I will send out a printed membership application form to you in the mail.

I look forward to seeing your name published in the **PSA Journal** as a new member.

31st Greater Lynn International Exhibition

Our 31st year brought major changes to the exhibition. We became a dual projection international, accepting both slide and digital images. With this change came an increase in entrants by 159 photographers. This continues to make us the largest single section exhibition in the world. My thanks to the 335 New England entrants who sent in an entry. Entries were split with 384 slide entrants, and 412 digital entrants. Only a difference of 28 lesser slide entrants. And when the judging was done we found that the acceptance rate as well as the winning medals came out also about half and half, slides and digital. The top award of Best of Show was a slide and the top total aggregate score (CAPA Medal) and top total New England score (Videtta Award) were both slide entries. That tells me that slides are still alive and will be for a few more years.

The spectacular showcase of the Best of the Worlds images was a split show, half slides and half digital and seen by over 500 people. We had 2 presenters this year. Barbara Rozavsky, MNEC put together the slide segment and Daniel Charbonnet, FPSA, MNEC put together our first ever digital segment. It was a rousing success and brought the audiences to their feet.

The 2007 exhibition had entrants from 32 states and 34 countries; honor awards went to 37 New England entrants with medals going to 18 New England entrants. Quite a showing for New England.

Our 3 judges were again local this year. My sincere thanks to Gail Hansche-Godin MNEC of Hubbardston, MA of the Gateway Camera Club; Jude Plante of Warwick, RI of the Photographic Society of Rhode Island; and June Visser EPSA, EFIAP of Hyde Park, MA of the Greater Lynn Photographic Association. They did a wonderful job of getting through the 3200 images in a short day and a half.

New England members receiving gold medals were:

The New England Camera Club Council Medal for Best New England Entrant went to Jacob Mosser III, FPSA, Hon-NEC, of No. Reading, MA a member of the Greater Lynn Photographic Association and a NECCC Vice President with his slide "Magnificent Bird #2".

Winning two medals was Gerald Tucker, PPSA, of Warwick, RI, a member of the Photographic Society of Rhode Island. Gerald won the second highest award of the exhibition, the FIAP Gold Medal with "Pulsatilla #2", and the Charles Woolnough award for best seascape with "Light on the Land #1".

Thomas Briere of Westford, MA, member of the Nashoba

Valley Camera Club, MA, won the FIAP Silver Medal with "Forest Montage".

Kent Crossley, MNEC of North Kingstown, RI, also a member of the Photographic Society of Rhode Island, won the FIAP Bronze Medal with "*Beautiful Sonya*".

Carlton "Skip" Hoyt, MNEC of Reading, MA, a member of the Greater Lynn Photographic Association, MA, won the PSA Best Creative Medal with his image "Yoda the Chihuahua".

Ed McGuirk of Wellesley Hills, MA, a member of Boston West Photographic Association, MA, won the Videtta Award for highest aggregate score by a New England entrant. This is the second year in a row a member from Boston West has won this award.

Peggy Arbeene of Malden, MA, a member of the Greater Lynn Photographic Association, MA, won a special medal in the Chairman's choice category with her image "Mandy #1".

Allegra Boverman of Nashua, NH, a member of the Merrimack Valley Camera Club, MA, won Best Photojournalism with "*Nick Arvanitis Funeral*".

Sherry Brandsema of Newmarket, NH, a member of the Seacoast Camera Club, NH won Best Domestic Animal with "Kittery, a NH Cat".

With only 39 slides entered, 6 awards fulfill the stipulation. Had all those entries receiving a score of 24 been included, the percentage would have been 35%, exceeding the requirement.

As usual, we remind you that you must identify your subject matter in accordance with the contest rules. "Cute" titles like "Mother Working" and "Reflection" with no ID tells us nothing. We do not see the slides. Thus we could disqualify any future entrant who has not given us an identity because he could be submitting the same subject matter.

Also, it is advisable to refrain from a subject just titled "sunflower" or "hibiscus" without additional explanation because they may not be true wildflowers and could get disqualified by the judges. In such instances the inclusion of the Latin name would remove all doubts.

In addition to all the many problems which beset the Fall report we found that due to a communications error, Frank Forward should have had a blue ribbon in the A Group. Our apologies.

There were 33 clubs represented submitting a total of 96 black & white, and 121 color prints. The organizer/coordinator for this event was Paul Hanson, MNEC. Serving as judges were Matthew Kabel, photography teacher and lecturer, Paul Peterson, MNEC, and Harold Sisken, MNEC. Score keepers for the contest were Dan Champagne, Paul Hanson, MNEC, Ruth Kahn, and Jayde Tomczuk. Scoring monitor was Christine Young. On the light box were Rob MacFarlane and Steve Wronker.

Interclub competitions would not be possible without the support of member clubs willing to serve as host for these events. Castle Craig Camera Club's willingness to "step up to the plate" when called is greatly appreciated, and all members involved in running this competition deserve a sincere "well done"!

A total of 217 eligible prints were submitted, 54 in class "A" (including 3 make-ups), 42 class "B", and 121 "Color" (including 1 make-up). In Class "A", 12 registered clubs submitted prints, in class "B" 13 clubs, and in "Color" 31 clubs. There were forty-six individual award winners: 13 in class "A" (25%), 7 in class "B" (17%), and 26 in "color" (22%).



As I review the records dating back to 1979 when we took over the nature Interclub Slide Competitions from Marion Belcher, MNEC some of the problems have remained a constant. These include not identifying the subject matter and resubmitting slides previously entered.

However, I am happy that so many of you still participate and contribute quality work. I hope that you will continue this next year despite the inroads caused by many switching to digital. I confess it is an easier medium.

Congratulations are in order for Lowell Camera Club who wins the medal in Class B for the highest accrued points. This club now moves to Class A.

There was a major infraction of the rules this time about which I am not happy. People do not read the contest rules or communicate when submitting slides.

The competition needs three host clubs for next year and I hope that some of you will step up. How can you go wrong with a free program and the ability to visually compare your club's work with that of others in New England. Please let me hear from you.

As you will note the percentage of awards given differed widely between groups A and B. The number is entirely dependent on the rule, "Awards shall be given in the amount closest to 15% of the total entry". We do not break ties. In the A group had we used only those slides receiving the score of 27 and 25, the award percentage would have been 7%. In the B group including the nine slides scoring 23 would have put the award rate at 38%. You have to blame the judges for so many like scores. This last contest is always subject to a decreased number of slides submitted. Many clubs don't bother to enter.

A list of those slides eligible for the slide of the year medal can be found on page 18 of this issue. All first, second and third place winners should be submitted to me by the time specified on the accompanying list. Please try very hard to get these in. You can't win if you don't try. I will send you a reminder in May. Hope to see you at the NECCC Conference in July.

I just think it's important to be direct and honest with people about why you're photographing them and what you're doing. After all, you are taking some of their soul.

Conference Digital Competition

NECCC will again be conducting its Digital Competition at the NECCC Conference in July at UMass, Amherst. The Digital Competition is open to anyone attending the Seminar.

Judging of the competition will follow the same general rules used in the NECCC slide/print competitions. Scoring will be from 9-30 points. Medals and Honorable Mention ribbons will be awarded in each category. In addition, a Best Creative medal will be awarded in the Open category. Registrants may enter one Open image and one Nature image file. PSA rules on Nature images will be used.

Any "altered reality" images must be entered in the Open category. Entries must originate as photographs (image/captures of objects via light sensitivity) made by the entrant on photographic emulsion or acquired digitally. By virtue of submitting an entry, the entrant certifies the work as his/her own. Images in the Open category may be altered, either electronically or otherwise, by the maker and artwork or computer graphics created by the entrant may be incorporated if the photographic content predominates. All final work must be in electronic file. Please see the NECCC website for full rules and instructions on this new digital competition.

If you entered the Yankee Photographic Society's digital competition on April 14, the procedures for NECCC's competition are the same. There are two parts to entering: First, you must use the electronic entry form found on the NECCC website at <code>www.neccc.org</code> (navigate to the Index and select Competition, Digital). Second, images will be sent separately in an email sent to <code>necccdigitalcomp@verizon.net</code>. The Entry Form and images must be sent on-line by email and must be received by Sunday, July 8, 2007. Submissions may be made by CD at the conference at the Hospitality Table area between noon and 5:00 p.m. on Friday. If you will not get to the conference until Friday evening or Saturday, you must submit your entry via the Entry Form on the website prior to July 8th.

You are encouraged to submit your entries before July 8th as the number of entries to be accepted on Friday will be limited.

A Status List of all entries received will be published on the NECCC website. Entrants can check the website to see if their images have been received in good order. The Status List will be updated at least weekly and will be posted until the judging takes place. A maximum of 2 images may be submitted per entrant.



The competition was directed by Win Hunter with assistance from Fred Lappin. Twenty-seven clubs participated with 107 photographs (one club submitted only 3 photographs).

The judges for the competition were:

Phil Sargent from the Upper Valley Camera Club Merlin Lacy from the Upper Valley Camera Club (backup judge who filled in when the competition had to be postponed and the original judge could not attend)

David O'Neill, a past member of the Upper Valley Camera Club.

Win Hunter made the following comments following the competition: "This format worked very well. I would encourage other clubs to run the competition, but would definitely like to have our club do this again. We have not been very active participants lately in NECCC competition. With this new format that just might change, I hope. Having non-digitally enhanced photos judged with the enhanced ones worked very well and was quite interesting to watch. First and second were one of each. The snowstorm did force us to reschedule and we did have to use our back up judge. You might make that suggestion a little more prominent in your instructions."

The three winning clubs are listed below, though a number of clubs are close behind them keeping the competition interesting. Also, even if your club is further down in the pack, be sure to send in your entries since it is still possible to win individual awards.

The Best in Show photograph was Loon Fishing by Mary Campbell from the Merrimack Valley Camera Club. This is the second time that a member of the Merrimack Valley Camera Club received the first place designation. The scores for all entries and all clubs are included as part of this report. A PDF document is posted on www.neccc.org/interclub.htm showing the award and honorable mention winners. You might want to share that information with your club members who ask what types of photographs win.

Problems

There are still a few problems that I want to call to your attention. It is important for the club representative sending the images to check to be sure that all the rules have been followed.

- 1. The allowed size for electronic slides is 1024 pixels wide and 768 pixels high. I received a few photographs that were 1024 pixels high. Remember that the size is governed by the projectors we use during the competition which, unlike slide projectors, have a horizontal, rectangular projection space rather than a square projection space. I also received a few others that were not properly sized at all.
- 2. We had two instances where two photos by the same photographer were submitted. If you have a member who is also a member of another club, be sure to have his/her permission before sending your entry. This problem is very easy to detect when I build the score sheet from the file names since it is easy to sort the information by maker name. In one case the club quickly sent an alternative entry and the other the club decided to go with only three entries.
- 3. There were a few file naming problems, though these were minor. Please use upper and lower case characters consistent with normal English usage rather than all caps or all lower case since the information in the file name automatically ends up in the competition reports without retyping. Also, use spaces where appropriate rather than running titles together or using underscore characters. I fixed some, but not all, of these problems this time around.

If you have lost your copy of the competition rules, you can download another copy from www.neccc.org/interclub. htm. You will also find the *Instructions for the Host Clubs* as well as the procedures the Director uses to prepare the photographs for competition.

As always I **strongly recommend** that you e-mail your entries well in advance of the closing date so that we have time to resolve problems, though the duplicate entries by one person probably won't be detected until I build the score sheet after all entries are received. I will always e-mail you back telling you that the entries have been received. If you do not hear back within 48 to 72 hours send me another e-mail asking the status. This way we can be sure that no entries evaporate into the great Internet. I would much rather respond to a few inquiries than have an entry.

The Digital Notebook:

File Format & Image Care (1.2) by Fred Drury

This column deals with the issue of whether to select JPEG or RAW format for create digital files. Depending upon which camera you have the options may include some or all of the following: TIFF, JPEG (small), JPEG (medium), JPEG (large), RAW or even combinations of RAW & JPEG. We'll also take a quick look at image downloading and archiving ... establish good standards for both, practice them religiously and you'll encounter few problems. The alternative is problems and the occasional disaster.

File Format

For some the choice between JPEG & RAW is seen as controversial with strong proponents in each camp and one side claiming its view is the 'correct' one. Personally, I don't think choice should be 'controversial' because each format serves a real need the other cannot provide. On the one hand JPEG facilitates rapid communications from the source to the ultimate use; e.g. newspaper and sports photography. On the other hand, RAW supports the higher quality necessary for larger prints and artistic interpretation.

JPEG is a compressible format. JPEG (small) uses the most compression and therefore creates the smallest files. JPEG files are smaller than either RAW or TIFF, hence one can store more JPEG images on a given size flash card. The problem with JPEG is that the information lost during compression degrades the image; the greater the compression, the more the degradation. This is not a problem for small prints or the lo-res images typically used on web sites, but it is a significant issue if your objective is the ultimate in quality needed for larger inkjet prints. In JPEG mode, the camera processes each of the pixel values the camera saw in accordance with the camera settings, compresses the file, and writes the processed 8-bit (255 levels) file to the CF card.

RAW uses no compression, hence files are larger and therefore one can store fewer images on a given size CF card. RAW saves the actual pixel values which the camera saw, at their original 12-bit depth (4096 levels), and also saves the camera settings that were used for that image; both are written to the CF card.

RAW processors, including the one Adobe includes with Photoshop CS2, allow one to revisit the settings, and make changes to them after the image has been made; they also deliver a larger 12-bit file. To me this is like letting me change the rules of the poker game after I've had a chance to look at my cards. The problem with RAW is both the larger file size, and the addition of the time consuming 'RAW processing' step to the overall workflow.

Shooting in RAW has the advantages of: 1) greater bit depth (and so more tonal information) and 2) the capability to make adjustments to the camera settings 'after the fact'. These two 'RAW advantages' are especially important to me as a nature photographer. Most of my photography is done in the golden hours around sunrise and sunset, where extreme tonal ranges are the norm. Consequently, I'm always pushing the limits of the camera tonal capabilities and there's the greater chance of clipping either highlights, shadows or possibly both. RAW lets me look at the image before I complete processing and make exposure adjustments to avoid clipping. Many believe the higher bit-depth (12-bit for RAW vs. 8-bit for JPEG) is helpful when aggressive image optimization in Photoshop would otherwise produce 'posterization', especially in image areas where continuous tones dominate, such as clear skies.

In a recent DDQ on the subject, Tim Grey (www.timgrey.com/ddq/) responded: "The advantage of RAW is certainly potential image quality. You have tremendous flexibility with exposure and color temperature adjustments after the capture, and you're getting high-bit data as well. This gives you the best opportunity to optimize image quality. It doesn't mean you should be careless about the capture, but it does give you more options to optimize (or improve) the quality of what you captured. The negative is that the files are larger (so they'll fill the camera's buffer faster and fill your card faster and take longer per-image to download), and that you'll have to actually process those RAW captures after the fact. In other words, it isn't the most ideal choice when it comes to an efficient workflow.

The advantage of JPEG is performance. The files are smaller, so the camera's buffer doesn't fill as quickly and you can fit more captures on a given card. From a cumulative perspective you can capture more frames in a given period of time (not necessarily in a given burst depending on the camera, but in a cumulative amount of time). The images are already in an actual image format, so you can view them immediately, send them to anyone knowing they can view them too, and see the images much faster (because they are smaller files that don't require a conversion from RAW to be viewed). The major

disadvantages related to potential image quality. If you make a mistake in exposure or color temperature, you don't have as much ability to correct it because the data from the sensor has already been converted and you don't have high-bit data. You also have the issue of JPEG artifacts that can affect the appearance of the image, especially when you want to enlarge the image significantly."

So to me there's no controversy in the choice between JPEG and RAW; each serves the photographer well in different situations. If you're planning to make larger prints I think RAW is the best choice. If you're trying for a rapid workflow and want to be able to immediately deliver images to a client, or to make a record of the grandchildren's' visit, JPEG is likely the best choice. As noted above, some camera manufacturers (e.g. Canon) even provide the option of simultaneously saving the image in both RAW and JPEG formats. This last option may be the answer for the wedding photographer who would like both the speed of JPEG in order to be able to quickly deliver proofs, and the processing advantages of RAW in order to deliver the ultimate in quality in a final print.

Of the several media available for in-camera storage, Compact Flash cards are preferred. I think it makes sense to stay with the best brands, and the most popular are SanDisk and Lexar. Lexar offers an 'Instant Rescue' utility which they claim can 'recapture those lost images': see: www.lexar.com/software/index.html.

Downloading Images

My practice is to download after each shoot. As most of you know I'm primarily an underwater photographer, so this means I most often download after each dive. On land, I usually download after the AM shoot and again after the PM shoot.

My procedure is always the same. Whenever I remove a 'full' CF card from the camera, I always insert a replacement which I know has been previously downloaded. I then reformat the CF card in the camera and check that the appropriate number of images is now available.

To transfer images from CF cards to my laptop, I have a PCMCIA card which has a receptacle for my CF card. The combination plugs into the slot in my laptop. I use Explorer to select (Ctrl-A) all the images on the card, copy them (Ctrl-C), and then paste them (Ctrl-P) in the appropriate folder on my hard drive. I then use Explorer to make sure that the images have indeed been copied to the desired folder and may even go into Bridge to make sure I can 'see' the images.

My practice is to place images in folders which are defined by the location and year of the shoot. For example, when I went to south Asia in March 2005, I opened a master-folder titled 'CamThiMal'05' for all the images I would shoot on that month-long trip. Within the master are 28 subfolders titled Anggun 01-06 (dive boat in Thailand & Myanmar), Siem Reap 01-11 (location of the Ankor Wat temples in Cambodia), etc. Within each subfolder, there may be a

further sub-sub-folder which further identifies specific locations (e.g. specific temples within the Ankor complex, which covers an area in excess of 100 square miles). In all the 'CamThiMal '05 master-folder contains all of the 2000 odd images I made during this trip.

Archiving

I'm sure that I'm not alone in being paranoid about losing my digital images. I've heard too many stories about lost luggage, damaged hard drives and stolen laptops not to be extra careful... and I don't think there's any such thing as being 'too careful'.

There are many alternative procedures that can be used to assure that important files are not lost or destroyed. I think the keys are that a) there is more than a single copy of important files. b) at least one copy of these files is in a separate 'protected' location, and c) whatever procedure you decide upon is followed in a disciplined way.

My own procedure calls for triple redundancy. As soon after I've downloaded the CF card as is practical, I like to copy the new images to a portable hard drive that I always carry with me on trips. The third copy is made by using the DVD RW on my laptop to burn a DVD. Typically I'll make this 3rd copy whenever I've enough new images to fill up a DVD. Once I return home, I prefer to store the DVDs outside my home... that way, no home catastrophe will result in the loss of the RAW images.

When at home, I generally use my desktop computer, rather than the laptop for image optimization. That desktop system is connected to an external hard drive which regularly mirrors any changes to files on the internal hard drives and thus provides and independent backup for working files.

In our next column we'll take a look at Bridge and the RAW Processor; two essentials for those who choose to work in RAW format.

Camera Care

The sale of digital cameras continues L to grow of course, which is good for the photographic economy as a whole. However, changes that are made in our daily lives seem to be our way of learning these days especially where cameras are involved. Those of us who are on the older side of our earthly life must try harder to keep up with newer and better things while retaining the best of the 'oldies'! Still, one wonders if camera club members now will be classified as photographers or aspiring artists? Making the big leap from film to digital should be fun and hopefully improve our photographic skills

Whale watching is great sport, but if your digital camera is splashed by ocean water wipe it off as much as possible immediately! If the salt water has penetrated around the control buttons or levers, it is best to put the camera into a reliable repair shop as soon as possible! 'Time' is not on your side where salt water is involved!

Since the digital memory cards have a serial number buried within them, digital camera owners could be faced with many irritating advertising possibilities in the near future from sales people bent on extracting our monies!

This time of year both film and digital cameras and lenses should be carefully checked for smooth operation. Older Nikon lenses converted for use on digital models should have their diaphragm action checked for any sluggish operation. The grease on the focus section of the barrel can vaporize onto the iris leaves from heat over time, which will make them 'sticky' and affect the exposure times.

The front lens surface of all your lenses should be examined for fingerprints and other residue. Before putting lens tissue on the glass, take a soft brush and wipe it into the edge of the glass to clean out any sharp edged material that could scratch the delicate lens surface, and then use the liquid cleaner. Avoid excessive 'swab-

bing' of the glass! The rear cover pressure plate on film models should also be cleaned every year. Finally, examine the entire body of both types for missing screws, buttons and levers, and be careful of the digital memory card, it must be kept clean! Our lens test for this issue shows a superior image resolution in the central area for both focal lengths, but the edges are weak!

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
