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






I believe Bob has won first place every year since becoming the editor of the "Bulletin". His efforts continue a long standing record of successes by NECCC council editors. The "Bulletin" has never looked so good! I know the awards will continue to come to Bob year after year.

Now, for the less than pleasant part of operating such a large photographic organization. At our last Board of Directors meeting, the council has deemed it necessary to increase the membership fees which are paid by the clubs. We have not had a price increase in many years, and our current fees do not even start to cover the postage and printing costs involved. The new fees will start with the 2009-10 season and will be: large clubs - \$30, medium clubs - \$25 and small clubs - \$15. I know any price increase is irksome, but they are still very reasonable for all that NECCC offers. Unfortunately we also need to charge a postage fee for the "Print Interclub Competitions" and "Print Circuits". Every year NECCC covers the postage fees for these which last year were over \$700. We cannot keep operating at such a large loss. Many of the clubs have indicated that they do not want to go to unmounted prints to save on postage fees and would be willing to pay more in order for the prints to remain mounted for the competitions. Thus the board has decided with the 2009-10 year there will be an additional \$25 per club per year postage fee to participate in these Print activities. An official letter will be going out to all the clubs soon.

On another happier note the Board has also voted to start an individual 'Color Print' circuit next year. That means there will be two circuits available, one for B&W and one for Color. If your club is not participating in NECCC activities, please join in on the fun. The activities are also extremely educational for your club members. Again please feel free to contact me with questions, or any other suggestions that might make the council work better for you as an individual or as a club. # Merrimack Valley Camera Club

The Merrimack Valley Camera Club (MVCC) meets every Wednesday night, starting the first week in September and concluding the second week in June, with its annual banquet. The weekly schedule of events is posted on the club web site www.mvcameraclub.org It includes digital and print competitions, respectively conducted on the first and second weeks of October through April. The digital competitions consisted of 6 categories (General, Manipulated, Nature, People/Portraits, Photojournalism and Travel); a member may enter one image each category monthly. Participation has been quite high with over 200 images being submitted each month. The print competitions also have 6 categories (large and small in both color and monochrome as well as creative and a monthly theme). Again, a member may enter 1 print in each category monthly. Appoximately 100 prints are entered each month. It should be noted that both the digital images and prints are pre-judged. On competition night, the activities consist of displaying the entries, announcing the scores and a short critique of each entry by the judge. The latter is considered essential to the competitions as they are intended to be learning events.

Other activities include guest speakers and presentations by club members as well as some field trips to local and not too distant site. Guest speaker topics include event photography, capturing night scenes, portrait photography and lighting. Some members will make hour-long presentations on High Dynamic Range (HDR) and variations of printing techniques. In addition, 3 meetings are set aside for members to present short shows (5-10 minutes) of their work, regardless of medium.

MVCC is also involved in a number of interclub competitions. For PSA, it is the host for the October Print competition, a dual projection Color competition in February, a digital Nature competition in May and a dual projection Color competition in June. In addition, the club will be conducting the Glennie Nature Interclub Exhibition on March 28. This is an all digital event in which each club submits 10 nature images for club and individual awards; it is expected that approximately 100 US and International clubs will be participating. The George Carlson Monochrome Print Competition will be held on April 29, with 4 clubs entering 20 prints each for club and individual awards. On May 6, MVCC will

also be the host for an annual interclub digital competition, which will also include the Gateway Camera Club, the Greater Lynn Photographic Association and the Stony Brook Camera Club. Images are submitted for each of 24 topics, a single judge will determine individual awards; club awards will be based on cumulative scores. In August, MVCC will be conducting 2 Photo Travel Division Dual Projection Sections for the PSA International Exhibition. Subsequently, a collection of the award winning and other accepted images will be presented at the annual PSA Conference being held in West Yellowstone, Wyoming. This hour-long presentation would also be available to local camera clubs, upon request.

On February 18, MVCC will be conducting a "Boys vs Girls" intra-club competition. Each team will submit 25 digital images each. A panel of judge will be invited to rate the image. This activity has been conducted previously with much enjoyment and success.

In January, MVCC will start an internal digital study group program. Participating in anonymity, each member will submit 2 images every two months. Following their submissions, they will review and provide comments, as well as visual feed, on the other group members' images. Each group will be limited to a maximum of 4 members.

#### Westfield Camera Club

The Westfield Camera Club season runs from September through April with an end-of-the-year banquet and awards program in May. The club meets every second and third Monday with the second meeting being our digital, slide and print competition night. We are continuing to advertise the programs sponsored by the Springfield Photographic Society in order to enhance our club members' photographic learning. This was our initial digital competition year. To get everyone off to a good start, the first program of the year was a workshop on how to enter electronic/digital competitions. Additional programs scheduled are the judging of the NECCC's interclub color slide section, viewing the latest PSA Tops in Photography and the NECCC digital circuit, a members' showcase and hosting digital shows on a sports photography primer and a club member's trip out to the western US. The club recently participated in a fund raiser for the Westfield section of the American Red Cross by providing digital images for their 2009 calendar.








# 33rd Greater Lynn International Exhibition

This will be the last call for entries. This year we have made it even easier to enter. As an individual you can now do your whole entry online and pay with PayPal. If you are part of a club entry you can not enter on line but your entry must be mailed to me in one packet from your club. Hopefully by now you have an entry form and have sent your images through a club entry, entered online individually or are planning on mailing slides or a CD to me soon. All clubs in the NECCC roster got a club mailing of forms and explanation letters the end of Dec. 2008. If you don't have a form, ask your president for one . You can also download the form at our web site - www.greaterlynnphto.org or or the PSA website www.exhibitionforms.com.. Remember the last date to receive the images is February 14, 2009. This is one week earlier than the judging. I can take the local entries after that deadline if necessary, but it would be much easier for the workers if they arrived on time.

As always the judging is open to the public and will take place on Friday, February 20, 2009 at 7:30 P.M to about 10:00 P.M. and Saturday, Feb 21st starting at 8:30 A.M. until we finish at about 5:00 P.M. The judging takes place at the Greater Lynn Headquarters on 564 Boston St., Lynn, MA. A map to the club is available on our web site. You can come and observe for one hour or stay all day. Lunch is provided on Sat for \$5 per person. We normally have about 30 to 40 people in the audience to view the judging. It lots of fun to watch. Each image is only on the screen about 4 to 5 seconds while its judged. Get a club entry together, send it in and then make a club field trip to GLPA to view your slides judged. This judging is quite different than the normal club judging you usually get to see. It has images from

all over the world on every subject matter there is. It's very fast paced and exciting. This is a unique judging seen only with International Exhibitions. Quite frankly, I wonder each year why our hall is not filled to capacity as you can learn so much just by seeing the images judged.


If you can't make the judging, you can still enter the exhibition and then come to see your slides in the show on April 4, 2009, at the Yankee Seminar in Danvers, Ma, or on Monday April 6, and Tuesday April 7, 8 PM at the Greater Lynn Club. Be among the worlds best or get your club known by entering 7 of your club's members work and wining the Best Club entry. All it takes are 4 slides or images per person, an entry form and \$7.00 (\$5 per person for a club entry). Club entries may be mixed, part slides and part digital as long as each entrant uses the same format for all 4 of their images.

Remember this is not 2 separate competitions but one expanded one where slides and digital will compete against one another, for the same medals and honors. **Any digital images sent to the exhibition on a CD will not be returned**. If you are not part of a club entry but entering as an individual, we would prefer you to submit your entry online. Further instructions for the sizing, naming and preparing your images for entry can be found in the entry form or online. All acceptances whether slides or digital will still count toward the PSA and FIAP star ratings in the color section. If you entered a slide previously to the exhibition and it was excepted you cannot scan it and re-enter it digitally. Once an image/title has been previously accepted into the show at Greater Lynn it cannot be re-entered no matter what format or re-titled.

The "Pick" photograph in each competition was chosen by the judges to be published in the NECCC Bulletin. All First place photographs received the same score and ribbon. The winning and HM photos in both sections are posted on the NECCC web site (www.NECCC.org).

There were a number of problems with this competition. Quite a few of the entries were not named correctly and had to be fixed. A number of entries were not sized correctly necessitating additional e-mails with the club reps to resolve as the maker always has to fix sizing problems, though I will fix naming problems if possible. Operating these competitions requires substantial work and naming or sizing problems only add to the effort required. We ask that all clubs, please double check your entries before sending them.

As always I strongly recommend that you e-mail your entries well in advance of the closing date so that we have time to resolve any problems. I will always e-mail you back telling you that the entries were received. If you do not hear back within 48 to 72 hours send me another e-mail asking the status. This way we can be sure that no entries evaporate into the great Internet. I would much rather respond to a few inquiries than have an entry lost.

Two entries failed to arrive for this competition. One was caught and eventually received because of checking on the part of the rep and the other was not caught resulting in the club missing out. Sending entries early helps to avoid this problem as there is time to resend if a problem develops. Also, if the rep is going on vacation immediately after sending an entry he/she should appoint an alternate to watch for the reply and resend the entry if needed. E-mail is wonderful, but not problem free. We can avoid problems by making sure a confirming e-mail reply is received and watching for my inquiring e-mails just before the closing to clubs not yet accounted for.

I also want to call the attention of future host clubs to the document Instructions for Host Clubs [a copy is available on the NECCC Internet site for anyone to download and read if interested]. Please, please read it carefully. In particular read the section on selecting judges. Also, there is a section on instructing judges on how to use the scoring system and the importance of using the entire range from 5 to 10 to minimize ties.

Not in the instruction document (but it will be in next year's version) is information on using the title slides to align the projector. Both title slides have a one-pixel wide yellow stroke around the entire 1024 x 768 pixel space. If this yellow line can't be seen on all four sides the projector needs to be aligned through the menu system (the procedure will vary depending on model). Some competitors put strokes around their images and if the projector is not aligned correctly that stroke may be missing on one side resulting in a possible loss in score.

Winter Competition: The second NECCC Electronic Photograph Interclub Competition of the 2008-09 season will be held on Wednesday, February 18, 2009, hosted by the Southeast Connecticut Camera Club. The location will be the Jordan Fire House on Rope Ferry Road, Waterford, CT. The competition will begin at 7:00 p.m. The closing date for receipt of entries will be Friday, January 23, 2009. This represents a change from previous documents so that I can receive and process the entries before leaving for a month in Florida. I will be monitoring e-mail while in Florida, but I would rather receive all the entries and mail the CD to the host club before I leave.

# Camera Care

According to sales records, the purchase of digital cameras is still quite strong despite the weak economy, but how long will it last? Hopefully, all through 2009 and beyond. Most digital models have an adjustment for WHITE BALANCE, which can also be used to alter the color cast of a scene. The red, blue and green pixels can be blended to change the original scene tonal values. If you are using a film camera, a color correction filter can be placed over the lens to strengthen or weaken the scene. Experiment a little for best results.

Sorry, but we do not have a DISAS-TER OF THE WEEK to report, but the winter weather will probably change all that! The lens test for this issue reveals an excellent CANON macro 50mm. A truly beautiful lens! Do not forget to remove your lens from the camera for cleaning!
