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

Yankee Photographic Society Says Good Bye

The Yankee Photographic Society was formed 30 years ago by Barbara Laatch-Hupp APSA MNEC as a chapter of the Photographic Society of America (PSA). In the beginning it met two or three times a year at various venues through out New England offering day long seminars with notable speakers such as Freeman Patterson and Galin Rowell. As time went on Yankee found a home at the Lawrence Regional Technical School and the format was expanded to include multiple speakers, models and hi-jinks setups. After several years of successful operation, the Technical School became unavailable due to renovations. A search crew of about four "Yankee" officers, took on the task of finding a new place to meet. Over the course of three months we visited over 40 local town high school and grammar schools. Finally with the help of Jon Hanniford paving the way with the town officers, the Danvers High School, became our long-standing final host.

At some time during the transition from Lawrence Regional to Danvers High School, PSA felt it necessary to place unacceptable conditions on it's "Chapters". The result was "Yankee" surrendered its PSA charter and became a separate organization, but retained its affiliation with PSA as a club.

"Yankee" has enjoyed a long and happy relationship with Danvers High School but all good things must end. The Danvers High School is also going to be renovated. Although the auditorium would be useable for a while the Back IMC rooms where we do the set-ups and model shoots would not. As many of you now know our liaison Jon Hanniford is also retiring. These two items together, among others, have brought us where we are today conducting our last seminar this past spring after 30 years of service to the Photographic community. Yankee will continue in name only offering Gold Medal Awards to major photographic events in New England, until we run out of medals.

Many of you have taken advantage of Yankee's excellent studio style model shoots. The good news is much of the team that made them possible will continue to make them available several times a year at the Greater Lynn Photographic Association. GLPA holds four model shoots a year open to the public, and for a small fee of \$10 to \$15 you will be able to shoot the models with the same lights and back grounds you had at Yankee. Beyond that GLPA is considering doing Yankee style photo events in the future. This would be at our Boston Street, Lynn location. These presentations would be on a smaller scale, on a Saturday in our main hall. We are also planning on some set-up days for next year. The Freeman Patterson Effect

We have all admired those soft dreamy images that masters like Ray Guillette, Andre Gallant, Jake and others have shown from time to time. These images were generally based on taking one slide in sharp focus at a small aperture like F 22 and a second slide with the same scene shifted out of focus using an aperture of F 4 or F 5.6. The slides were then montaged. Because they were putting two slides together, the makers would often adjust the exposure on one or both images to the over side to avoid having too much density. They might even zoom the lens prior to the second exposure to keep the out of focus image slightly larger, but in about the same proportion as the sharp initial exposure.

While their techniques may have varied, they all followed the general lead of a well known photographer named Freeman Patterson who, to the best of my knowledge, pioneered the dreamy style that results. The good news is that a few of the Photoshop gurus have been able to simulate this effect using a single digital image. The following steps closely follow those recommended by Mark Johnson.

Open a suitable image. Try using a bed of flowers or a tree with autumn foliage if you never tried the slide version before, since not every subject looks good with this technique. Duplicate the background layer and change the blend mode to Multiply. Those of you with CS3 or CS4, convert the layer for Smart Filters before going further. (Sorry Elements workers, this option isn't available for you.) Apply a Gaussian Blur so that the effect looks dreamy. Settings between 5-15 pixels generally work well, but feel free to experiment.

While still on the Background Copy go to Edit > Transform > Scale (In Elements Transform is found under the Image menu.) Make sure the link between the height and width boxes is checked and apply a setting of between 101 and 103 in either the width or height box (the other box will adjust automatically) and select OK until the dialog closes. This is an optional step, but it provides the size adjustment effect that we used to get by zooming on the second out of focus image.

The result is effectively complete, but it often lacks a nice sense of highlight and shadow. To add these, with the Background copy active create a new Levels Adjustment Layer. Drag the White input marker (the top scale of the two is the input values) to the left until you see the brightest pixels turning white then back off a bit. Next drag the Midtone marker to the left until the middle tones open up. There are

no hard and fast values here so make the adjustment to get the look that you like. Fill the layer's mask with black to hide the lightening effect entirely. Now using a medium size, soft edged brush set for 50% opacity or less and with white selected as the foreground color, paint on the layer mask in white to "reveal" the highlights where you want them. Don't be afraid to vary the opacity of the brush or to make multiple passes to adjust the extent to which the lightening is seen.

Select the Background layer to make it active. Add another Levels adjustment layer. This time drag the black output marker (the bottom of the two scales is the output scale) to the right until you see the shadows open up. Again, there is no hard and fast value for this, just what you like. Fill

the layer's mask with black to hide the effect. Now using a medium to small, soft edged brush at 50% or lower opacity, paint with white over the shadow areas that you want to bring out to let the adjustment show through. This too is something you need to do to taste.

You'll want to save the finished working file as a PSD or TIFF file with all of the layers present. You can then flatten it and size it for projection or printing. It should go without saying but, since our intent was to get a soft dreamy look you won't bother sharpening the final output.

2009 Glennie Nature Interclub Exhibition Results Announced

The George W. Glennie Memorial Nature Interclub Exhibition was held on March 28, 2009 before an audience of about 50 members and guests. Many of the attendees expressed their appreciation for having the opportunity to view so many strong and varied images. They also said that they were already looking forward to next year's event.

The all digital format continued to show merit as 95 clubs (versus 52 in 2008) participated in the event. There were entries from 20 states (CT, DE, FL, GA, IL, KY, MA, MD, ME, NC, NH, NJ, NY, OH, PA, RI, SC, TN, TX and VA) as well as Australia, Canada, New Zealand and the United Kingdom. Continued growth is expected in the coming years as a number of the invited, but non-participating, clubs indicated that they would be better prepared to submit entries next year. Invitations will also be extended to all clubs world-wide, as well.

The Exhibition is open to all photographic clubs and all are welcome to participate. Any club that did not receive an invitation for this year's event should contact Chair Charlie Burke (<u>nichburke@yahoo.com</u>) to insure inclusion in the 2010 invitation list. It is an expressed goal of the Exhibition to have as many clubs as possible join in this unique event.

The Judges Panel consisted of Marilyn Cloran, FPSA, MNEC Greater Lynn Photographic Association; Paul Smith, MNEC, Gateway Camera Club and Shiv Verma, Stony Brook Camera Club. After scoring the 945 images, they also assisted in making "Best Of" and Merit Award selections in the various individual categories. In addition, they choose a personal favorite among the high scoring images. The Chair made a selection, as well. In a closing remark, the Judges indicated that some images would have scored higher if they had not appeared to have been overworked (generally, too much color saturation and sharpening).

What is A-DEP?

Many owners of Canon digital SLR's have no doubt noticed the A-DEP setting on their cameras' control dial but have never used the setting. It is a very useful feature on those cameras and one that you will come to use once you understand what it can do for your photography.

If you have been around photography for a while you no doubt used the depth of field settings on your manual focus lenses or consulted a chart. That is old hat with the newest incarnation narjed as A-DEP as it works with the multiple focus points where you make sure that what you want to be in sharp focus is locked into the nearest and the farthest LED points in your viewfinder. You do this by depressing the shutter release half-way to get the points locked and then, recompose and take the picture by depressing the shutter release all the way down. Try it, you'll like it.

The Digital Corner

What is Digital Raw?

We hear a lot now about shooting in the camera raw format. A digital raw file is composed of

- 1. The raw sensor data from the camera.
- 2. The metadata (which records exactly how the picture was shot iso setting, shutter speed, etc.

The raw file simply records the luminance value of every pixel, so that the raw file is actually a grayscale image. It contains color information.

The raw converter interprets the sensor data and controls white balance, color interpretation, tone mapping, noise reduction, antialiasing and sharpening. All of which, are in your control when you convert the raw data.

Simply put, shooting in digital camera raw is the digital equivalent of a film negative.

If your camera offers camera raw, you should be using it because in the conversion process, you can control the scene interpretation. You can even reinterpret the basic exposure by resetting the white and black points.

33rd Greater Lynn International Salon

fter a very long 2 days of judging, the 2009 international is over. Our 2009 exhibition was again a duel projection judging, however we did things a bit differently this year. In order to give the slides the best viewing possible, we judged all the slides first on Friday night than went into the digital judging. Our total entrant count this year was an amazing 1088 entrants, with 150 of those being slide entrants. This is the largest number of entrants we have ever had, and while it's great to be the biggest one section exhibition in the world it's also a huge amount of work. This year saw major changes in our exhibition. We made online registration and PayPal available to our entrants on an individual basis. If you entered through a club you still had to go through the old route of mailing it but that may also change next year. With all this digital work came new helpers to the exhibition.

Andrew Katsampes set the online process up and continued to make changes as necessary during the submission time to make it easier to use. Pam Stanley MNEC took on the task of receiving the digital submissions and preparing everything for the judging day, as well as designing and setting up the program used for the judging. My deepest gratitude goes out to both of them as this could not have been done by me alone. Although I am learning the lingo, my digital and computer knowledge is very limited. As a matter of fact I am still in the stupid mode!! On the day of the judging we had 5 laptops linked together and all went as smooth as silk. My thanks to the operators of the laptops, Dan Charbonnet, Rick Cloran, Amy Musinsky, Pam Stanley and Lori Trembaly. My thanks also to Shiv Verma (Stony Brook CC) for his donation of the magic boxes that link them all together on one network.

Last year's show was great in its new dual format, but this year's show was all digital, and seen by over 500 people. Our showcase presenters Barbara Rozavsky MNEC and Dan Charbonnet FPSA, MNEC did an outstanding job of putting the images to music into a spectacular showcase that was a great end to over eight months of hard work. All of the accepted slides (about 170) were scanned for the show. Although their acceptance rate was the same as the digital images, there just weren't enough of them to make up their own portion of the presentation. Our percentages for slides and digital were excellent with slides winning 5 of the 30 medals given out this year.

This year's judges were Ed McGuirk from the Boston West Camera Club; Shiv Verma MNEC from the Stony Brook Camera Club; and Barbara Rozavsky MNEC from the Greater Lynn Photographic Association. My thanks to the judges who were great and very patient during this long one and half days. At least this year we didn't have a major snow storm to deal with.

As I stated, this year's exhibition had 1088 entrants, an increase of 158 over last year's. There were 938 digital entrants and 150 slide entrants. About 360 of the total number of entrants were from the six New England states, an increase of 20 compared to last year's numbers.

This is not an easy exhibition to get an image accepted into as the number of entrants is so large and the work is the best from all over the world. Only about 32% of the 4,332 images submitted were accepted for the show. Images are judged on a scale of 3–15 points, which each judge scoring 1-5. The accepted score (an image scoring high enough to be in the show) this year was 12 points or higher.

Of the 37 medals given this year, 14 were awarded to New England entrants. This is down by 5 from last year's stats. Three PSA and six FIAP Honor Awards are given to higher placed images not winning a medal. Two of the FIAP Honor Awards and all three of the PSA Honor Awards went to New England entrants. In addition, 50 New England entrants received GLPA Honor Awards. This is a very high increase of 20 HA from last year. Another great showing for New England entrants.

Congratulations to all who have an image accepted into the show. If you continue to enter these types of exhibitions, these acceptances will count toward your star rating. Star ratings are fun to try for and an honor to achieve. Your name gets known as a top photographer when you list a star rating after it. Further information on star ratings can be found at www.psa-photo.org

Congratulations also to the Merrimack Valley Camera Club of Andover, MA for winning the largest club participation medal for the 4th year in a row. This year with 49 entrants, again an unheard of feat!

The Best Club award went to Stony Brook Camera Club of Wretham, MA, who took first place by 5 points. In 2nd was Boston West Photographic Society of Framingham, MA and 3rd went to The Photographic Society of Rhode Island.

The New England Camera Club Council Medal for Best New England Entrant went to Gordon Yu, of Quincy, MA, a member of the Boston Camera Club, with his image "Rebecca 1".

The FIAP Bronze Medal went to Joan Shirley of Wrentham, MA of the Stony Brook Camera Club with her image "Osprey Lunch"

The Charles Woolnough Award for Best Seascape went to Ian Dicker, of Sudbury, MA a member of the Boston West Photographic Society with his image "Portland Sunrise"

Eva Gryk of New Britain, CT won the David Hughes Medal for Best Abstract with her image "St. Pio's Stairway San Giovanni, Rotondo, Italy"

Natalya Pluzhnikov of Providence, RI, a member of Photographic Society of Rhode Island won the Michael Videtta Award for the "Highest Aggregate Score" by a New England Entrant.

Marilyn Cloran, FPSA, MNEC of Swampscott, MA, a member of the Greater Lynn Photographic Association won a special medal in the Landscape category with her image "Shadow at Sunset".

Michael Goodman MNEC of Newfields, NH a member of Boston West Photographic Society won the Best Landscape Medal with "Before Sunrise Dallas Divide"

Turning Slides to Digital Without a Slide Scanner

Thru the kindness of a good friend I came into the possession of a Nikon Coolscan. But it proved to be slow and problematic. So how to copy slides to digital cheap and clean?

First you need a camera and lens combination that will close focus to fill the frame with the slide film chip or reasonably close to it. I use an old 100mm macro lens adapted to fit a Canon 40D. Next you need to hold the slide in place for re-photographing, this is where your ingenuity comes in.

- 1) Take a medium sized corrugated cardboard box and cut off the top flaps.
- 2) Then cut a 1 3/4 X 1 3/4 square hole in the center of one end of the box.
- 3) Inside the box at the opposite end from the square hole tape a sheet of very white paper.
- 4) Position a lamp to illuminate the white paper without it shining on the outside of the box at the end with the square hole. A simple goose neck desk lamp works well.

Use a common (tungsten) light bulb and set your cameras white balance to "tungsten" and shoot in both high quality JPEG and RAW, you can work with which ever format you like for adjusting color cast, shadows and highlights as needed. The slide itself is centered over the 1 3/4 X 1 3/4 square hole outside the box and held in place with the blue painters tape available at any hardware store. Set your camera on a tripod and the box on a table, fine focus is done simply by nudging the box back and forth (auto-focus off). Make three exposures, one as metered, one plus a stop or so and a third minus a stop or so.

To me, photography is the simultaneous recognition, in a fraction of a second, of the significance of an event

To photograph is to hold one's breath, when all faculties converge to capture fleeting reality. It's at that precise moment that mastering an image becomes a great physical and intellectual joy.

To take photographs means to recognize - simultaneously and within a fraction of a second - both the fact itself and the rigorous organization of visually perceived forms that give it meaning. It is putting one's head, one's eye and one's heart on the same axis.

To aid in judging entries, overseas entries not in English must include four (4) copies of summary or translation, not including advertisements. All four printed copies of one regular issue newsletter must be fully assembled. Have your entry weighed correctly for FIRST CLASS MAIL. Entries received with postage due will not be accepted. Mail entries flat, with cardboard, in a sealed envelope. Do not use staples or paper clips to attach the entry form to the newsletter as it can be damaged in transit. Electronic entries must be submitted as pdf files.

Entry Divisions: Chapter/Council; Small Club (4-75 members); Large Club (76+ members)

Closing Date: June 1, 2009

Judging and Rating Information: Qualified judges, each judging independently, will review your entry. Following review, each judge will rate your entry in its total presentation compared to entries in your division only. Points and awards are determined from these ratings. The size of the newsletter, quality of paper, printing process, or whether or not advertisements are used have no bearing on points and awards. Content, layout, good use of space, neatness, clean print, ease of reading, simplicity, and style are of basic importance. Before you enter please obtain a copy of the Judging Worksheet from the PSA website or Margaret Sprott, Director of the contest-

Drury's Digital Diary - 2.2 Merged Layer

Previously I described alternative Clean-Up workflows depending upon the type of work that was required to clean up the image. This issue I explain the need for, and the process of, creat-

ing a Merged layer.

Merged Layer

You will recall that several columns back I identified important criteria around which this image optimization process is built. One of these was traceability ... to do the work such that when one later reopened the file one could clearly see the individual workflow steps. Therefore one could revert to any point in the process, make changes, and then complete the workflow in the same manner as the original.




Figure 2: The Layers Flyout menu is one method of adding a layer of merged data to the top of the Layers stack




Figure 1: Applying the Shadow/Highlight tool will produce an error because Photoshop believes 'the active layer is empty'.

Figure 1 shows the Layers palette for an image where the Clean-Up procedure has been completed. The next step is going to be a Shadow/Highlight process. Shadow/Highlight can only be applied directly to an image. The Clean-Up layer on top of the Layers stack does not qualify. What is needed is to combine the two layers shown into a third to which one can then apply the Shadow/Highlight tool.

There are a couple of ways to do this in Photoshop[®]. First, click on the uppermost layer in the stack to make sure it's 'active'. Looking carefully at Figure 1, notice the small down-pointing arrow at the top right corner of the Layers palette... clicking on this arrow will open what is called a flyout menu (Figure 2). With a quick look at the menu, you'll see the Merge Visible choice

fourth up from the bottom. Unfortunately, if one selects that command, Photoshop® will create a merged layer, but one that replaces all the other layers in the process thus compromising traceability. The objective is to preserve those existing layers and add the merged layer on top of the layers stack. Here's how to do it ... first hold down the <Ctrl> and <Alt> keys, then click the flyout menu arrow, and while holding down the left mouse button, drag the cursor to Merge Visible ... then (while holding down the <Ctrl> <Alt> keys) release the mouse. The new Layer will be placed at the top of the stack (Figure 3) ... and automatically named 'Layer 1'.




Figure 4: Layers palette with layer renamed as 'Merged Layer'




Figure 3: Double click on the Layer name and you'll be able to rename it as appropriate

The second and easier way to do this is a keyboard shortcut. With the uppermost layer in the stack 'active', use the left hand to hold down the <Shift>, <Ctrl>, and <Alt> keys, then click the letter 'E' with the right hand. This too will put the new merged layer on the top of the stack.

To change the name 'Layer 1' to something more descriptive, double click on the existing name and then enter your choice. In Figure 4, 'Layer 1' was changed to 'Merged Layer'. The resultant layer stack is now ready for the application of the Shadow/Highlights process.

In future columns I'll introduce Photoshop's Shadow/Highlight adjustment. Since Adobe added this feature about three years ago, it has become an essential component of my image optimization workflow.

Remember, once a photograph has been entered it may never be entered again. Entry in pictorial means it may not be entered in nature, and vice versa. These rules are slightly different from the rules used by the color and nature slide competitions so reps should carefully read the new rules document when it is issued in late summer.

The Spring 2009 Interclub Print Competition was held on March 24 at the Seacoast Camera Club in Portsmouth, NH. The event organizer and coordinator was Alan Bennett. Serving as judges for this competition were: Don Chick, Tom Hindle, and Barry Nation.

Don Chick is the owner of a very successful portrait studio and has taught at the Seacoast Camera Club. A certified professional photographer, Don has won numerous awards for his photography. Tom Hindle (*www.imagesofthepast.com*) owns a professional photography studio, but his specialty is the restoration and printing of glass plate negatives. His business is located in Stillwater, Minnesota. Barry Nation has owned three successful camera stores in New Hampshire, and is now retired. He has presented programs on travelling to the Hymalayas and Hot Air Ballooning, and also served as a judge at Seacoast on numerous occasions. A dedicated group of volunteers shared the work of getting prints ready for competition night, running the competition, and performing "wrap-up" work involved in getting prints ready for return to their respective clubs: Alan Bennett, Paul Hopkins, Jackie Linder, Sandy McMillan, Kathy McQueeney, Eva Powers, and Mark Stevens.

Many thanks go to the Seacoast Camera Club for accepting the offer to serve as the Spring 2009 host club, and especially to Alan Bennett and all the members of the volunteer crew who shared the work involved in holding this event. This was the first interclub print competition held at Seacoast, and their eagerness to "step up to the plate" is greatly appreciated. Many thanks to all for a job well done! A total of 214 prints were submitted: 69 in Class A, 29 in Class B, and 116 in Color. Participating were 28 clubs, 16 in Class A, 9 in Class B, and 28 in Color. During the course of the day-long event she managed to sign up several attendees to join the ranks of the PSA. I also would like to express my appreciation for all of the hard work that Jim Dionne, MNEC puts in on behalf of PSA in the great state of Connecticut.

One of the great perks that were available to new members, as well as long time members, was to be able to purchase Adobe products direct from Adobe at a substantial discount using a special code assigned to PSA. 2009-2010 NECCC Digital Circuit Details,

It's time to prepare and send your entry dues and collect the images for 2009-10 NECCC Digital Circuit. By now ou should have received information about the circuits wit the associated entry forms. As we did last year we will have two categories, one general/open and the other will nature. Your club may participate in one or both.

The Digital Circuit has been designed to make participation simple. The deadlines for the digital circuit are as follows: A participation form and the \$5.00 fee per category (\$10.00 for two) is due by June 30, 2009.

The deadline for image submission is July 25, 2009. This gives us time to prepare the circuits for the judges, allows them enough time to judge thoughtfully and record a commentary. The circuit images will be assembled into a show and the taped commentary will be used as the audio track in the show. Individual CDs will be distributed to participating clubs with any awards/ certificates and overall results just as was done last year. If we do not receive the images on time, the rest of the process will be much more difficult. Thank you in advance for helping us out.

Please do send me your \$5.00 fee per category by mail. A single \$10.00 check will be ok for entry into both Please note that you do not need to predetermine your date for showing the circuit images and commentary. It's best to collect six digital images per category before your club adjourns for the summer. To further simplify matters you may submit your images via email to images@vertalis.com—be sure to indicate your club name and the words "NECCC Digital Circuit" in the subject line. In the event you are unable to email images please prepare a CD and have it available for the Sunday morning breakfast for NECCC reps at the July NECCC conference. If this isn't possible, please mail the CD to me at the address above.

You should have received an email from me with a document attached detailing the image preparation and naming convention, a listing of the clubs and their short names and a presentation outlining the circuit. Please be sure to follow these guidelines as we would like to keep this process as simple and automated as possible.

Dealing with a Color Cast

In this digital age, one thing that seems certain is that there are a dozen or so ways to do almost everything in Photoshop. Here is one of mine for dealing with a color cast.

Open the image you want to edit

From the main menus select Image > Duplicate Image and click OK to accept the default name and create the copy.

Working on the copy (duplicate) image from the main menus select Filter > Blur > Average

This will turn the duplicate image into a uniformly toned / colored nothing. That is what you want as it provides input for the correction

Reselect (click back on) your original image and position it so that you can see it and the now blurred duplicate at the same time. You don't need to be able to see all of the duplicate, just enough so that you can see a portion of the uniform color.

Using either the menus (Layer > New Adjustment Layer > Levels and click OK to create the layer) or more simply just clicking on the "Add New Adjustment Layer" icon (half black - half white circle) in the bottom middle of the Layers pallet) on your Layers Pallet and selecting Levels add a Levels Adjustment Layer to your original image.

Select the gray point (middle) eye dropper on the Levels Adjustment Layer

Move the eye dropper over the uniform color on the duplicate and right click with your mouse to have the Levels Adjustment Layer pick up that color as middle grey.

You should see an immediate change in your original image colors as that blurred color (which contained the effect of the color cast) is interpreted to be a clean 18 percent grey (sans color cast). You can click to toggle the layer dialog box image preview on and off to see the change that took place.

If you like the correction, click OK to accept the new Levels Adjustment Layer on your original image. (If you need to, you can still use the normal levels sliders to adjust the whites, blacks and midtones in your image further before accepting it or by reopening it later.)

Go back to the duplicated image and close it without saving. It has served it purpose

Try this on an image that you feel has a pesky color cast that you haven't been able to quite get out using other methods.
