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President's Message

Winter is here, nature's quiet season. The landscape seems still. Birds and animals are less active. But winter presents many opportunities for both outdoor and indoor photography. Skies are less hazy, enhancing the brief golden hours after sunrise and before sunset. Earlier sunsets make winter the best season to capture a cityscape at twilight with building interiors fully lit. Beaches are empty and sand patterns are at their best. And a fresh carpet of snow transforms an ordinary scene into something magical. Be sure to

carry extra warm batteries. And let your gear warm slowly before opening your camera bag indoors to prevent condensation from collecting on your equipment in the warm air.

Winter is a great time to make still life images indoors. Flower photography in the warmth of home is a favorite winter pastime of mine. Macro images of flower parts are best shot with indirect light. Try this in a west-facing window in the morning, and use a foil reflector to balance the light. In the afternoon, flower arrangements can be backlit in your west window. Two or more reflectors are needed to fill in the shadows caused by backlighting, and a simple background should be positioned to allow light to fall on the flowers. A light diffuser, such as waxed paper, can be taped to the window to soften the light. A tripod is needed since longer exposures with small apertures will maximize depth-of-field.

Program Co-Chairs Gail Godin, MNEC and and David Godin have already planned much of the exciting weekend activities. Pre-conference Portfolio Critiques will be back. Obituaries

William Korkosz, APSA, MNEC

Tilliam (Bill) Korkosz, APSA, MNEC, passed away on November 24, 2009 in Hartford CT, at age 78. Bill was born in Chicopee, MA and was a 30 plus year member of the Springfield Photographic Society. He was also a long time member of the Photographic Society of America, the Charter Oak Photographic Society in Hartford, CT., the Yankee Photographic Society, and a member of the Massachusetts Camera Naturalists (Cam-Nats). Devoted to photog-



raphy he worked for many years in the hi-jinx room at the annual NECCC conferences and than became a Vice President and board member on the New England Camera Club Council in charge of the Hi-Jinx room for several years. He was awarded both an "Associate" (APSA) of the Photographic Society of America and a "Master" (MNEC) of the New England Camera Club Council for his various photographic efforts and work for both of these photographic organizations. An accomplished nature photographer, Bill enjoyed photographic trips with friends to Alaska, Africa, most of the United States, and to Churchill, Canada to live on the ice with the polar bears.

He was a frequent judge at local camera clubs, judged various NECCC interclub competitions in both Color and Nature, and had also judged various International exhibitions including the Springfield International Salon and the Greater Lynn International exhibition. He was also a multiple star rating competitor in both PSA's Color and Nature Divisions in PSA approved international photographic exhibitions.

Bill was an electronics technician for the US Army, serving in Germany during the Korean War, and worked as an engineer for Pratt-Whitney in CT. until his retirement.

Most recently he had bought a winter retreat in Florida, and enjoyed being down there with other New England friends through our trying New England winters, photographing the abundant bird life available in numerous wildlife parks. We will miss his beautiful nature photography and his photographic knowledge which he generously shared with others.

Jack Alexander

Tack Alexander passed peacefully in his sleep at home on October 28th. His camera interest began nearly a half century ago when he joined the Color Slide Club of Brockton. Shortly thereafter he became the Club President, joined PSA, the Yankee Photographic Society and even had a brief stint with the South Shore Camera Club. His final stop was the Hockomock Digital Photographers where he was their PSA representative and Treasurer.

Not one to slow down, Jack was an active member of PSA's Color Slide Division since 1978 working as a commentator for a slide study group. He was awarded many certificates of appreciation, recognition and commendation for his continued work on this project throughout the years. In 1990 he was awarded a CSD Medal, one of the highest awards for significant contributions to the CSD and most recently, in 2008, he was awarded a Special Service Award for 30 years continuous service to the CSD (now known as the CPID). Jack was very proud of this award. He held a 4 Star competitor rating in PSA International approved exhibitions in color and 1 Star in Nature

Jack frequently put on slide travel programs for churches, local libraries and any other organization that asked for his travelogues. If a club needed an instructional presentation, he was ready. Improving camera techniques, composition, portraiture, whatever, Jack had something to share with his audience. Even though he was a member of a digital camera club, he stayed true to his roots and still shot film. He had visited all fifty states with particular interest in those within the Rocky Mountains. Jack was so impressed with this area that he modeled his extensive train layout around this region -The Intermountain Pacific. His time spent on this avocation coincided with his photography - 50 years. As a member of the National Model Railroad Association, he received

All First place photographs will receive the same score and ribbon. The winning and HM photos have been posted on the NECCC website at www.neccc.org if you are interested in what type of photos win, please take a moment to view the winning images. For this competition 39 clubs submitted 428 photographs.

New Nature Rules

Many of you may have heard that the PSA Nature Division updated their definition of nature at the convention held in West Yellowstone recently. The new definition is as follows:

"Nature photography is restricted to the use of the photographic process to depict observations from all branches of natural history, except anthropology and archeology, in such a fashion that a well informed person will be able to identify the subject material and to certify as to its honest presentation. The story telling value of a photograph must be weighed more than the pictorial quality while maintaining a high technical quality. Human elements shall not be present, except where those human elements enhance the nature story. The presence of scientific bands, scientific tags or radio collars on wild animals is permissible. Photographs of artificially produced hybrid plants or animals, mounted specimens, or obviously set arrangements, are ineligible, as is any form of manipulation that alters the truth of the photographic statement No techniques that add to, relocate, replace, or remove pictorial elements except by cropping are permitted. Techniques that enhance the presentation of the photograph without changing the nature story or the pictorial content are permitted. All adjustments must appear natural."

This new definition means we have new freedom to use digital techniques to enhance our nature images. In two recent communications Dan Charbonnet added the following clarifying comments which help to understand the new rules:

"For most people, this means that the various HDR techniques are now allowed and it means blurring the background is now allowed, provided the results look natural."

"All images must be considered "Digital Realism," where a photographer may perform any enhancements and modifications that improve the presentation of the image to make it more closely represent the original scene photographed but that does not change the truth of the original nature story. Cropping and horizontal flipping (equivalent to reversing a slide) are acceptable modifications. Removing spots due to dust on your sensors is allowed. Removing rounded slide mount corners on scanned images is allowed. Adding ele-

ments to your images, removing pictorial elements from your image other than by cropping, combining separate images or rearranging and/or cloning and/or copying elements in your image are not still acceptable and can lead to disqualification of your image in the competition. Since HDR techniques and Helicon Focus techniques are techniques that enhance the presentation without changing the pictorial content, they are now considered allowable techniques. Please note that all adjustments must still look natural. Just because a technique is legitimate does not guarantee the image it was used on will get a good score."

Effective with the Winter competition this new definition will apply to the NECCC Nature Interclub. Keep in mind that we do not require images to meet the requirements of the PSA definition of Wildlife. Zoo shots and game farm shots are eligible provided the artificial habitat is not apparent in the image.

The final determination of what constitutes nature rests with our judges. The judges are instructed to give a low score to photographs that do not meet the definition. The directors do not determine if a nature image is legitimate.

If you have additional questions about this new definition we will try to answer them or attempt to get answers from persons who know more about the subject.

A Few Night Photo Tips

Monlit landscapes in snowy rural areas, brilliant lights of the city and urban landscape, the beauty of a light-house and the sea bathed in moonlight are just a few of the wonderful images that we can capture at night. Our modern digital cameras afford us a degree of control that was never available to us using film. This is not to say that digital is perfect but is an exciting leap forward in our ability to create great images at night.

If your camera has a "Night" setting then that is clearly the best method to use with your camera. This feature takes care of all of the difficult calculations that beset many users of film who wanted to take night photographs. Be sure to turn off your flash when using this mode else you will over illuminate the foreground unless you wanted to create a scene with a fully detailed subject in the foreground with the lights of the city in the background.

Please remember that it is light that makes your night photography a success. Using a high quality camera with higher resolution will result in better detail in your night image without excessive "noise". Although it is not the same as grain with a high speed film emulsion it is seen as such by many photographers. The higher the resolution the lower the incidence of noise making for a much better image.

Some of the best lighting happens just after sunset while there is still light in the sky. This helps to bring out details of buildings against the sky that would otherwise be lost when it is really dark. It adds that something extra to our photography at night.

One of the major considerations we need to take regarding night photography is camera shake. Here is where Image Stabilization comes into play to minimize any camera movement, especially when we handhold our cameras. If your camera is not equipped with the IS techology then you need to use a tripod or other firm support for your camera. Some of the support I have used in the past includes placing the camera on the roof of a car, holding it against the side of a building, holding it on top of a park bench, and any other inanimate object. One caution, however, is that when you are on a bridge that any support is going to be subject to movement due to traffic on the bridge so rely on high ISO settings to compensate.

Last, but not least, is to take multiple shots at varying exposures and angles and pick the best for display. You can also take multiple shots of neon signs and then, using photo software, overlay the images to create a unique multiple exposure.

The 2009 Ocean State International

The fifth annual Ocean State International (OSI) Color Dual Projection Exhibition, hosted by the Photographic Society of Rhode Island (PSRI), was judged on November 7th. Many local New Englanders won high honors. The exhibition had a total of 201 entrants, 1,152 images (both digital & slides), from 22 countries and 24 US states, resulting in 383 accepted images (33%). Six clubs entered, with the Cape Cod Viewfinders winning the Best Club Entry Medal. The other clubs (in order of scoring) were: Greater Lynn Photographic Association, Merrimack Valley Camera Club, Gateway Camera Club, Stony Brook Camera Club and the Iran Camera Club.

Local New Englanders who won were Skip Hoyt, MNEC from GLPA, PSA Gold Medal – BEST IN SHOW for "Saturday Night with Tiffany",Vega Buchbinder from GLPA, Best New England Entrant Medal (medal sponsored by the NECCC) for "Light Before the Storm", Dennis Goulet from PSRI, Best PSRI Entrant Medal (sponsored by The Yankee Photographic Society) for "Close Approach", Ronald Wybranowski from MVCC, Bronze Medal, for "Waterfall in the Subway", Dennis Goulet from PSRI, Bronze Medal, for "Eagle Power Stroke", Ray Guillette, MNEC from SBCC, Best Slide Medal for "Waves of Sand", Dan Charbonnet, FPSA, MNEC from SBCC, Judge's Choice Medal, for "Leopard Stealing Duiker", Sarah Musumeci from MVCC, Judge's Choice Medal for "I Need a Hug".

Hope to see all this year's local New England entrants, and many more new one's again next year at the Sixth Annual OSI. Coordinate a club entry and your club will receive a copy of the accepted images multi-media show on CD.

A really big benefit for new member is the all new Individualized Photography Course. The following is the information sheet produced by PSA for new members and it is certainly a great benefit and enticement (along with some special deals from Adobe) to entice you to join PSA.

Photographic Society of America Individualized Photography Course

There will be no timeline for lessons, nor will there be pressure to work at a particular speed. We hope you will complete the course, however, much like college, it is up to you. Our goal is to make available to you, the tools of photography and assist you in their understanding. If you are already familiar with the tools we are hopeful this will give you practice and feedback to improve on the skills you understand. The course is designed to enhance your PSA experience.

After joining the Photographic Society of America (PSA), this course is available to you any time in your first year. You

will have six (6) months to complete the course. At the end of that period we hope you will be finished. If, however, you are not finished, the course will end. If the six month period extends into your second year, that will be just fine as long as you remain a PSA member.

After completion of an assignment, and when your instructor is satisfied, a new assignment will be sent to you. If you finish the course early, you will be allowed to do post graduate work of your choosing for the remaining portion of the six (6) months. You may submit additional projects from the textbook, or create your own in depth project.

The tools for this course are very simple. You need to buy the textbook; "John Hedgecoe's Complete Guide to Photography," published in 2004, by Sterling publishing. It is available from major book sellers or on the Internet by using Google to search for the following number: (978) 1402716539.

34th 2010 Greater Lynn International Exhibition (Dual Projection)

This will be the last call for entries. To accommodate the slide makers we are still accepting sides for this years exhibition along with digital entries. Hopefully by now you have an entry form and have sent your images through a club entry, entered online individually (pay pal is available for payment) or are planning on mailing slides or a CD to me soon. If you are part of a club entry you can not enter on line but your entry must be mailed to me in one packet from your club. All clubs in the NECCC roster got a club mailing of forms about January. 10th, 2010. If you don't have a form, ask your president for one . You can also download the form at our web site, www.greaterlynnphoto.org or the PSA website www.exhibitionforms.com . Remember the last date to receive the images is February 12, 2010. This is one week earlier than the judging.

As always the judging is open to the public and will take place on Friday, February 19, 2010 at 7:30 PM to about 10:00 P.M. and Saturday, February 20th starting at 8:30 A.M. until we finish at about 5:00 P.M. The judging takes place at the Greater Lynn Headquarters on 564 Boston St., Lynn, MA. A map to the club is available on our web site. You can come and observe for one hour or stay all day. Lunch is provided on Sat. for \$6 per person. We normally have about 30 to 40 people in the audience to view the judging. It lots of fun to watch. Each image is only on the screen about 4 to 5 seconds while its judged. Get a club entry together, send it in and then make a club field trip to GLPA to view your images judged. This judging is quite different than the normal

club judging you usually get to see. It has images from all over the world on every subject matter there is. It's very fast paced and exciting. This is a unique judging seen only with International Exhibitions.

If you can't make the judging, you can still enter the exhibition and then come to see your images in the show on April 10, 2010, at the Danvers High School, 1 P.M. or on Monday April 5th, 7:30 PM at the Greater Lynn Club. Be among the worlds best or get your club known by entering 7 of your club's members work and wining the Best Club entry.

All it takes are 4 slides or images per person, an entry form and \$7.00 (\$6 per person for a club entry). Club entries may be mixed, part slides and part digital as long as each entrant uses the same format for all 4 of their images.

Remember this is not 2 separate competitions but one expanded one where slides and digital will compete against one another, for the same medals and honors. Any digital images sent to the exhibition on a CD will not be returned. If you are not part of a club entry but entering as an individual, we would prefer you to submit your entry online. Further instructions for the sizing, naming and preparing your images for entry can be found in the entry form or online. All acceptances whether slides or digital will still count toward the PSA and FIAP star ratings in the color section. If you entered a slide previously to the exhibition and it was excepted you cannot scan it and re-enter it digitally. Once an image/title has been previously accepted into the show at Greater Lynn it cannot be re-entered no matter what format or re-titled.

I'll be the Judge of That

Without a doubt, no other topic creates as much passion, fervor and controversy as does judging. Photography is an emotional process that cannot be measured and quantified with ease. A photograph is a subjective artistic expression of the maker, which a judge is then expected to critique objectively.

The difficulty for judges is that critiquing is not only an intellectual exercise but an emotional one as well. The judging criteria is weighted equally in three categories – impact, composition, and technicality. If a photo exhibits an exceptionally high standard in one of the three categories, the judge is expected to turn off the human part of them selves in order to resist the temptation to unbalance the weights due to an emotional response.

The hardest category to suspend one's own emotional response is impact because it is the first visual element people respond to. This emotional response is subjective. Subjectivity is one's opinion - either you like it or you don't. Opinions are personal and dependent on mood and mind set. They come and they go, they strengthen and wane. There is no logical reason for this. Opinions are after all opinionated. Feelings, emotions and inspirations are the basis of creativity. Did the muses visit me today or were they off trying to create a grading process?

This is why judging will always have subjective influences. Divorcing oneself from personal preferences and biases

is not only difficult but nigh impossible. Judging requires that a factual perspective be applied to an emotional process. Yet at the same time the competitors critique the judges with comments like "he didn't get it" or why did "my" pride and joy not win. These are emotional/subjective responses to the judges supposed factual decision. By assigning a number to a photograph, it is relegated to a simple technical exercise rather than an artistic pursuit.

This is also why there should be three judges. With multiple judges there are checks and balances in place to minimize subjective influences. Just remember, we are only human with built in biases and personal weaknesses. Do not abuse the judges or a club will not be able to find any. Respond to their number or critique in a creative way. Be open and learn from it or ignore it and move on, that's you choice.\ In the end, photography should be fun. The aim of one's membership in a club should be the mutual enjoyment of photography as well as the advancement of one's knowledge and practice of the art and science of photography. An individual's creativeness as well as comparison of techniques and learning new techniques from peers is more important than a number assignment.

Photograph for yourself. Either you like your work or you don't. If you don't, keep trying. Some of your photos will be better than others, some strong, some weak. The muses will allow creativity to win out over a number. But that's just my opinion.
