

Antoinette Gombeda, APSA, HonNEC (<u>agombeda@optonloine.net</u>) will contact the pre-conference attendees the first week in July with the class location, location of registration package, updated information, etc.

Participants in any Workshop must also be paid registrants for the Conference. Class size is limited. Register early. The fee for all of the workshops (except the Raptor workshop) is \$66.95 (this includes a 3% UMASS administrative fee). The fee for the Raptor workshop is \$99.91 (including 3% UMASS admin. fee). For laptop classes you may choose to share a computer with a friend/spouse or just come and take notes/follow along.

"Quick 10 Minute Workflows in Adobe Photoshop CC for Nature Photographers" by Hector D. Astorga (Texas) www.hectorastorga.com> sponsored by Santa Clara Ranch

Hector D. Astorga is a professional nature photographer, photographer guide and photography workshop instructor. Tired of spending hours in the computer working on your images? In this on-hands workshop we will show you how to create great images using quick 10-minute workflows in Adobe Photoshop CC. We will show how to go from Adobe Bridge, to Adobe Camera Raw, and finally to Adobe Photoshop CC in quick and easy workflows that will produce great images in little time. Note - this workshop will NOT cover Adobe Lightroom. Prerequisites: Participants will be expected to have Photoshop CC pre-loaded and activated on their laptops and know how to open and save files. Those who prefer to use Photoshop CS6 may still participate, but need to understand that some features covered in the class may not be available or may be implemented differently in PS CS6. This Pre-conference workshop is for all skill levels.

"Innovative Night Techniques: Beyond the Milky Way" By Mark Bowie (Massachusetts) www.markbowie.com> Sponsored by ADKPI

This new workshop will be divided into three sections, the first a presentation, "Innovative Night Imagery: Beyond the Milky Way", followed by a few live demonstrations on processing night images and then the remainder of the time devoted to hands-on post-processing session. Example images will be provided on a thumb drive for each student to practice processing techniques. Students may also bring their own images to process. These might include images of the Milky Way, multiple exposures for reducing noise and for creating star trails and star circles, and time-lapse sequences. Mark will go in-depth on strategies and techniques for: Photographing the landscape in relation to the stars, moon, meteors, northern lights, and other celestial objects, Shooting moonlit landscapes, Determining nighttime exposures, Focusing in the dark, Reducing noise in-camera and in processing, Combining separate exposures for the night sky and the landscape, Shooting and stacking multiple exposures to expand depth of field and

reduce noise, Painting with artificial light, Processing night images with Lightroom, Photoshop, StarStax, and Starry Landscape Stacker. **Prerequisites:** Students should bring a laptop with the following (or similar) processing software installed: Lightroom, Photoshop, StarStax (free), and Starry Landscape Stacker (Mac only). Free trial versions are available from the developers. Having each piece of software is <u>not</u> mandatory; students can watch Mark demonstrate. **This Pre-conference workshop is for all skill levels.**

"Digital Artistry with Photoshop" by Ella Carlson (Massachusetts) www.ellaprints.com

To create composites in Adobe Photoshop is to be able to create worlds limited only by one's imagination. The art of combining multiple images into a cohesive art piece is complex and fascinating. Join award winning digital artist Ella Putney Carlson for a three-hour workshop full of tips and techniques for making great composites using Photoshop. From concept to completion, Ella will touch on the elements of successful compositing including selections, lighting, color and texture as well as sharing many of her favorite techniques and shortcuts to make your workflow faster. **Prerequisites:** Participants will be expected to have Photoshop CS6 or CC pre-loaded and activated on their laptops and know how to open and save files. **This Pre-conference Workshop:** for intermediate to advanced skill levels.

"The Joy of Selective Focus" by Kathleen Clemons (Maine) http://kathleenclemonsphotography.com Sponsored by Lensbaby

Learn how to use your Lensbaby or just come and try some Lensbaby lenses out! Learn how to control your Sweet Spot and how to See in a New Way. Selective focus is Kathleen's favorite way to make photographs; she is a big fan of blur! Kathleen will do a presentation and then work with attendees on selective focus techniques. Her presentation will include focal length and lens choices, aperture selection and how to use blur correctly when using very shallow depth of field, and critical focus techniques essential to this technique. Without leaving my home, year in and year out I generate images that account for up to 40% of my annual sales. I will share some of these images and how they were created. Doing set-ups, techniques,

equipment, flash, macro, lighting, backgrounds and more. Some subjects that will be covered will be Feathers, Rocks (Agates), Butterflies, Beetles, Garden, Flowers. Come and learn about ways to take dramatic photograph and make money without having to travel the world. Bring your appetite to learn and your questions; leave with a better understanding of creating images that are Colorful, Creative and Conceptual – and hopefully create currency for you! This breakout session is for all skill levels.

Pre-conference Workshop for all skill levels: "Photograph Birds of Prey and Raptors" Ken Hubbard (New York) www.kenhubbardphotograghy.com Sponsored by Tamron

Ken will assist you and give you advice on lenses, light, composition, exposure and depth of field while you are using (your own or a borrowed) Tamron lenses and shooting portraits of the birds. You will also learn about shutter speed, auto focusing modes, focusing tips and more. During the shoot you'll be able to try out the latest Tamron lenses, for FREE! Test a variety of long zoom lenses perfect for photographing wildlife, and get expert advice from Tamron wildlife shooters. A valid Credit Card & Driver's License is required for equipment check-out and will be kept on file until return of equipment. Test Drive Loaner gear is FREE. **Prerequisites:** Bring your dSLR or mirrorless camera. Borrow Tamron lenses and learn how to take beautiful photographs of these majestic Raptors. This workshop will be outside, weather permitting (a backup inside location) **This Pre-conference workshop is for all skill levels but please note that you must be able to walk and stand for this three-hour workshop.**

Macro Water Droplet Workshop by Don Komarechka (Ontario, Canada) www.donkom.ca

Step into a world of photography that most artists consider magical. Photographing refracted images within water droplets reveals not only the beauty of simple physics, but it opens the creative doors to unlimited possibilities in macro photography. This hands-on workshop will explore some of the smallest subjects that photography has to offer, and is open to anyone of any skill level. Expect it to be challenging, but you will walk away with images you'd be proud to share. Prerequisites: For this workshop, bring any photographic gear you have to "get close". Macro lenses, close-up filters and extension tubes work great. If you don't have dedicated macro equipment, we can make something work with reversemounting lenses to get close. Even with simple gear we can make magic happen! You will also need to use flash or have a VERY bright flashlight, but flash is strongly preferred. Even if the flash is simply of the pop-up variety, buy yourself a snack (Pringles) on the way to the workshop and you've got the necessary tools to make it work perfectly for you. Tripods are optional. I shoot all of my images without a tripod, but some people are more comfortable with this equipment. Whether or not you bring a tripod, I'll be encouraging you - at least once - to attempt the shots handheld to see how you handle it. With the right technique, it's easier than you think! This Pre-conference workshop is for all skill levels.

"Portraits Unplugged: Natural Lighting Techniques with Models at the Graffiti Wall" by Bobbi Lane and Lee Varis (Massachusetts) www.bobbilane.com Sponsored by Fuji

Photographic techniques using natural light with character models at the Graffiti Wall. Portraits Unplugged is all about natural light, nothing technical or mechanical. Everyone has natural light available, but not necessarily the understanding of how to find and manipulate it with reflectors and diffusers to create the most pleasing or effective image. We will explore how the qualities of light contribute to the feeling of the portrait. We show how to find the light, place your subject in the background and use reflectors and diffusers to modify and control the light. These masters know how to work with all kinds of light, come and some Check out unplugged <www.bobbilane.com/Personal/Portraits-Unplugged/45>. Please note inclement weather dictates that we move this event to another location. Prerequisites: dSLR or mirrorless camera with a 24-105mm type lens (a 70-200mm is a good portrait lens too but you must be able to hand-hold it for three hours). Bring a diffuser/reflector if you have one (you do not need to purchase one for this class, although after using them in use you might want to visit Hunts and purchase one). Note: You must be able to walk to and stand for this three-hour workshop.

"From Capture to Print" by Jim LaSala (New Jersey) www.jimlasala.com Sponsored by Moab

This hands-on workshop involves learning all of the aspects of an image from capture to print and having full control of how we want our images to be viewed. The following will be covered in this hands-on workshop: Using available light, Post processing/Lightroom/Photoshop/Plugins, Printing (getting your images where they need to be) on Moab's Fine Art Papers and Understanding ICC Profile. Participants will leave with a BW print of their own. **Prerequisites:** laptop computer with Photoshop CS6 or CC, Lightroom, and Topaz BW Effects installed. **ThisPreconference workshop is for all skill levels.**

"Light Painting Flowers and Still Lifes" by Jose Leiva (Maine) www.joseleivaphotography.com

Jose will first present a "real-time" demonstration of the technique of light painting. He will apply the technique on still life compositions, using ordinary tools. Jose will assemble the final image on the computer so that all attendees can view post production work. Following the demonstration, he will open discussion and questions regarding his technique. The rest of the time will be dedicated to photographing some still life setups provided by Jose. **Prerequisites:**Participants will bring their cameras and tripods and photograph some setups provided by Jose. **ThisPre-conference workshop is for all skill levels.**

"Take Control of your Lightroom Workflow" by Rob Sylan (New Hampshire) < www.sylvanworks.com > Sponsored by Wacom

The bedrock of any Lightroom workflow is being in total control of your catalog, your photos, and any associated preview caches, templates, and presets. In this session, you'll learn the fundamentals of this incredibly powerful tool — covering the Library and Develop modules where you manage, keyword, edit and enhance your images. Learn how to quickly and easily import, organize, edit, rate, and enhance your images, and how to work through large shoots efficiently with synchronized settings and presets. **Prerequisites:** laptop computer with Adobe Lightroom Classic installed. Note that although Lightroom Classic will be used for this pre-conference workshop, this workshop also would apply to Lightroom LR6 users. **This Pre-conference workshop is for all skill levels.**

"Creative Editing Techniques in Lightroom" by Betty Wiley (Massachusetts) www.bettywileyphotography.com

Take your image editing to the next level by going beyond the basics using Adobe Lightroom. In this session, you will learn various creative editing techniques which includes ways to create dramatic lighting, selectively adding color and punch to images, adding a grunge or edgy HDR look to photos, creating black and white with selective color, using the range masking feature, as well as the use of split toning and much more. Prepare to be amazed by what Lightroom can do! Betty will provide images and you will watch her and then do the same techniques for this hands-on workshop. Prerequisites: Students should have Adobe Lightroom (preferably Adobe Lightroom Classic but participants with LR 5 or 6 will also get a lot out of this hands-on workshop) installed and running in their laptops. This class will assume that students have some basic knowledge of Lightroom and therefore will focus on intermediate editing techniques to create more unique looks and effects than can be achieved by just using the basic editing sliders alone. You may choose to register and share a computer and look on with a friend or just come and take notes if you learn better without your computer. This Pre-conference Workshop: for intermediate skill levels.

PRE-CONFERENCE IMAGE CRITIQUE Friday, July 14 (9 am - Noon) The pre-conference workshops and Image Critiques will run concurrently, so you cannot attend both.

One of the special opportunities available to attendees at the NECCC Summer Conference is a one-on-one evaluation of your photographs by an experienced, accomplished New England photographer. This is your opportunity to have up to 15 images (prints and/or digital) reviewed by one of New England's top photographers/judges. The cost is \$41.20 per 40 minute session. Reviewers include Bill Barnett, APSA, AFIAP, MNEC; Jake Mosser, HonPSA, EPSA, HonNEC, and Sarah Musumeci, MNEC. Participants can discuss their work on an individual basis. If you sign up for this service, a confirmation form will be sent to you by June 23rd. You must return the form by June 29th. You will then be contacted via e-mail with the time slot and reviewer to whom you have been assigned. If paying by check write a separate check.

Why do I need this? Creative people don't have absolute standards against which they can measure their work. Much of its value depends on how well it connects with another viewer. When you look at your own images, you remember the special experiences you had when you captured them or how hard you had to work. The person critiquing your images is only looking at the final versions and will probably see them differently than you do. All creative people, not just photographers, have a variety of ways to receive feedback. Writers rely on editors to help them improve while speakers depend on audience reactions. Musicians attend master classes to refine their technique guided by an experienced performer. We all need help from mentors to improve our craft. The critiques at the NECCC Summer Conference provide an opportunity to receive knowledgeable feedback. Why not try it?

NECCC Conference Door Prize Extravaganza 2018

The various sections are being judged all over the USA in most cases on the same weekend-August 11 & 12, 2018. Nature digital is being judged in England this year, but the prints will be judged in CA. Along with the nature section, PSA also offers other sections such as Projected Image or Open (judged in AZ), Photo Travel digital and Prints (judged in England), Photo Journalism (judged in CA,) Photo Journalism Prints (judged in TN) and Pictorial Prints (judged in OK) which has 4 sections Large Color and Large Monochrome and Small Color and Small Monochrome. If you are into doing 3D they also accept slides (judged in VA).

Judging of the PSA Nature Image of the Year Monday, August 6, 2018, 2 PM

This August, we will be judging the PSA Nature Image of the Year at Greater Lynn Photographic Assoc. (GLPA) headquarters. The judging will take place on Monday, August 6, 2018, at 2pm. and should take about two hours.

Every year I invite the photography public to attend the judging and to date no one has shown an interest. This year the club was booked for a function on the weekend so we are doing the judging on a week day.

There will be about 400 - 450 images being judged. These are images that have won medals in PSA sanctioned nature exhibitions through the past year all over the world. The images also will come from entrants from all over the world and will be the best nature images in the world for the past year. The judging will be open to the public and the Greater Lynn auditorium is air conditioned. If you like nature; come down and check it out. There will be no commentary, only three judges scoring each image from two to five points for a total of six to fifteen points per image. There will be one medal winner in open nature and one in wildlife chosen with a small number of Honor Awards. We will also be judging the best Nature Print of the Year but these will be viewed as digital images as it is very difficult to get the prints and handle them as they are all unmounted. One Medal for prints and a small number of Honor Awards will also be selected by the judges. This is an invitation only competition. You must have won a medal to enter.

Our judges this year will be Richard Cloran, HonPSA, MPSA, HonNEC, Michael McNeill, APSA, MNEC and Jacob Mosser, HonPSA, EPSA, HonNEC. All have multiple galaxies in PSA International Exhibitions and have been awarded many medals in Nature exhibitions. All three are also members of GLPA and members of CamNats, an invitation only Nature photography club.

These are the best nature images in the world and we have such strong nature photographers in New England that I am amazed each year that no one comes to the judging.

An Alternative Approach to Dodging and Burning By Rick Cloran HonPSA, HonNEC

Let's start by acknowledging that one of the most common comments we hear from judges is to selectively burn in (darken) or dodge (lighten) areas or elements in our images. Both Photoshop and Elements have popular tools appropriately named the Dodge and Burn tools. The most recent versions of those tools produce better results, have the ability to allow the user to select whether the tool will work primarily on highlights, midtones, or shadows, and have an additional control in the "Protect Tones" check box. These tools are sized in the same way we size any brush and have an "exposure" setting that equates to a brush's "opacity". Since they are readily available, this is where most users start when learning how to dodge and burn on their images.

The downside of using these tools is that it can be very difficult to correct a mistake. Yes, if you notice it immediately you can step back in history to an earlier state undoing what went wrong. However, if you don't notice it immediately or later change your mind, you are left hunting and pecking in the History panel trying to find where you made that misstep. You can use the opposite tool to try to lighten something that you made too dark or darken something you made too light, but that is also hit or miss. Hopefully, you used a separate copy or composite layer for the dodging and burning so you can just throw it away and start again if it becomes a lost cause.

A second, somewhat less well known, method is to add a blank layer, fill it with 50% gray, set the blend mode for the layer to Overlay and then paint on the layer with a regular brush. If you paint with white, that area is lightened or dodged. If you paint with black, that area is darkened or burned in. You can change the opacity of the brush to vary the intensity (strength) of the lightening or darkening. You can "erase" an area for a redo, by filling that area again with 50% gray. The downsides here are that the effect is not constrained to highlights, midtones or shadows, unless you have a selection in place before you start painting. What you paint over will be lightened or darkened. A second downside is that when you darken something in the Overlay blend mode contrast builds up very rapidly. This can make it more difficult to find the right level of burning and is one reason most authors recommend using a brush with a very low opacity and building up an effect with multiple strokes.

What I will suggest you may want to try doing is to add two blank layers to your file. Change the Blend mode of one to Soft Light and name that Burn. Change the blend mode of the second layer to Overlay and name it Dodge. To lighten an area

paint with white on the Dodge layer. To darken an area paint with black on the Burn layer. The Soft Light blend mode builds contrast less quickly than Overlay and so you have more control over the how the darkening effect develops. The Dodge layer holds contrast better than Soft Light so you will retain more contrast when lightening an area. As with the more traditional solid 50% gray layer, you will want to use a low opacity brush and multiple strokes to build up the lightening or darkening to taste. This approach still has the issue of lightening or darkening everything you paint over unless a selection is in place, However, if you do make a mistake, you can just take the Eraser tool and erase the paint out of that area and then repaint as needed.

What I have found when using this approach is that I have a much better feel for what is being lightened or darkened because each effect is on its own separate layer. I can turn the layer on and off to see exactly what the effect is. I can use separate layers for different areas if I want. It just takes another blank layer set to the appropriate blend mode. Yes, you could use the two blend modes with the 50% gray layers to take a similar approach, but you will still have to fill an error with 50% gray to fix it rather than simply erasing the paint out of that area.


If you have done dodging and burning in the past but wanted a way that provides a little more control, try the two-layer approach I described. You may find that dodging and burning are your newest best friends.

Fall 2017 Inter-club Print Competition

The fall 2017 inter-club print competition, hosted by the Stony Brook Camera Club, was held on Tuesday, November 7, 2017 at the Norfolk Public Library, in Norfolk, Massachusetts. The judges for this competition were: Charles Burke, HonPSA, FPSA, EPSA, Dan Charbonnet, HonPSA, EPSA, MNEC and Ken Wiedemann, MNEC.

Charles Burke is the former President of the Photographic Society of America, former Chairman of the Massachusetts Camera Naturalists (CamNats) and a past President of the Merrimack Valley Camera Club. He is a well known and much sought after photography judge, lecturer, and presenter throughout the New England states, and beyond.

Daniel Charbonnet is a Vice President and member of the Board of the NECCC, and a former Exhibition Services Vice President of PSA. Dan is a member of the Greater Lynn Photographic Association, a member and past chairman of the Massachusetts Camera Naturalists (CamNats), as well as past chairman of the PSA Nature Division. He holds multiple Star and Galaxie ratings in Color Projected Image, Nature, Photo Travel, and Photojournalism. He's also a club, interclub, and International Exhibitions judge, lecturer, and author on a wide range of photographic topics.

Ken Wiedemann began his photography while in his early teens. His photographs have been published worldwide in numerous magazines including Down East, Forbes, New England Living, Vermont Life, and others. He has served extensively as a judge throughout the New England area.

The Stony Brook competition crew included Tony Mistretta acting as chairman, with Dan Gyves, David Marshak, and Jim West serving as print handlers. Debra Boucher and Ellen Kawadler kept track of the scores. Ed Gooltz was overall advisor, having run the previous interclub print competition hosted by Stony Brook (fall, 2013). While the score tallying and verification was taking place, the judges commented on the highest scoring prints, explaining what they liked and what might have been done to improve their scores. A fairly light attendance meant that there was plenty of pizza, other snacks, and beverages to go around. Many thanks go to the Stony Brook Camera Club for stepping forward to host this competition. To the competition committee, judging panel, and everyone else who helped with this first print competition of the season.... well done! Without the participation of member clubs willing to serve in this capacity, continuing to offer interclub print competition as a council activity would be impossible.

Twenty one clubs participated in the Fall 2017 print competition, submitting a total of 159 prints... 48 in class "A" B&W, 28 in class "B" B&W, and 83 in the color division. Twelve clubs competed in class A", eight in class "B", and all 21 clubs in color. A total of 30 prints received awards... 8 class "A", 9 class "B" and 13 in Color. Because of a larger than usual number of ties for 1st and 3rd place in class B and color, there are no Honorable Mentions in those two divisions. Clubs that submitted less than their full allotment of four color and four B&W prints, or that missed the fall competition entirely, are encouraged to submit make-up prints along with their regular submissions for the winter competition, to be hosted by the Boston Camera Club on Tuesday, February 20, 2018.





Winter 2018 Inter-club Print Competition

Arthur S. Vaughan, HonNEC NECCC Print Chairman

From a very detailed report provided by Arlene and Henry Winkleman:

On Tuesday evening, February 20th the Boston Camera Club hosted the New England Camera Club Council (NECCC) Winter Print Competition.

Our judges for the evening were: Elisif Brandon of the Newton Camera Club, Robert Pizzano who is currently the President of the Greater Lynn Photographic Association and Robert DeRobertis who is currently the President of the Stony Brook Camera Club. Robert DeRobertis stepped in to be a judge the night of the competition when the third judge was unable to attend. Two of the judges declined to accept any remuneration.

Elisif Brandon is a member and past president of the Newton Camera Club and has been judging for camera clubs including Merrimack Valley, Nashoba Valley, and Boston CC since 2005. She started her own business as a professional architectural photographer 10 years ago, after discovering her passion for photographing buildings. Elisif shoots exteriors and interiors, in both residential and commercial settings, for architects, remodelers, interior designers, developers, and commercial real estate. She also enjoys photographing rusty things, classic cars and looking for close-up abstract details. Elisif has a PhD in Marine Biology and has done grant-writing for charter schools.

Robert DeRobertis is currently the President of the Stony Brook Camera Club, has served as Print Competition Chair, is a certified NECCC judge, and is on the list of NECCC Judges. He describes himself as a "drive by" photographer. If he is out "driving by" something and it catches his eye – he stops, takes out his camera and photographs. Robert just happened to stop by to watch the competition. Bob stepped in to be a judge when, ten minutes before the competition was to begin, we realized the third judge had not arrived and would not be able to attend.

Bob Pizzano is a founding member of the Draper Photo Club and has been a member of Greater Lynn Photographic Association (GLPA) since 2012 where he is currently serving as President. At GLPA he competes in the Masters class in prints, winning Overall Image of the Year in 2015 and Digital Class A Image of the Year in 2017. Bob has won several New England Camera Cub Council (NECCC) Electronic and Conference honors, including a Best Botany Gold Medal in 2011 and Best Photojournalism Gold Medals in 2015 and 2016. Unlike many seasoned photographers, Bob does not have a decades-long history of photography dating back to childhood. In fact, he was a "snap shooter" who had never taken his camera off "auto mode" until 2008. Then, during a minor mid-life crisis, he decided to explore the meaning of life and took up photography. Educated and working as an Electrical Engineer, he finds the technical side of photography comes more easily to him than the artistic side. Bob was a member of the Boston Camera Club from 2008 to 2012, winning Image of the Year in 2012.

In order for this event to be a success a great deal of organization and hands-on-help was needed. On the Friday before the competition 4 members came to our home to label and organize all the prints. The prints then had to be transported to the Church on Tuesday. On the evening of the competition prints had to be organized and handled for viewing. Several people were involved with scoring electronically and on paper (as a check and balance against errors), and then prints had to be repackaged. Following the competition we worked to triple check each club's prints, complete the paper work, seal and label all boxes.

Twenty-one (21) clubs participated in the Color competition with 1 club submitting make-up prints. Nineteen (19) clubs participated in the Black and White competition with 1 club submitting make-up prints. There were seven (7) clubs participating in Class "B" B&W and twelve (12) clubs participating in Class "A" One club that usually participates in the competition did not submit images but is expected to send them to the Spring competition as make-ups. A total of 82 prints were submitted in the Color competition. A total of 75 prints were submitted in the Black and White Competition – with 47 prints in Class A and 28 prints in Class B. Clubs that submitted less than their full allotment of four color and four B&W prints, or that missed the Winter competition entirely, are encouraged to submit make-up prints along with their regular submissions for the Spring competition, to be hosted by the Photographic Society of Rhode Island on Tuesday, April 17, 2018.

Spring 2018 Inter-club Print Competition

Arthur S. Vaughan, HonNEC NECCC Print Chairman

The Spring 2018 Interclub Print Competition, hosted by the Photographic Society of Rhode Island, was held at the Lakewood Baptist Church in Warwick, RI on the evening of April 17th. The judges for this competition were Ken Carlson, GPSA, Ray Guillette, HonNEC, and Mike Roman, MNEC.

Ken Carlson first became involved in film photography over 30 years ago, and in 2009 switched entirely to digital. A member of the Greater Lynn Photographic Association since 2011, he competes in the Masters Class (print and projected image) with an emphasis on Nature and Scenic categories. In 2017, he won the "Best Article Award" for newsletters from the PSA in the Opinion category titled "Why Do People Hate the Rule of Thirds". In 2018, he was awarded the third level designation for Portfolios of Distinction by the PSA (only one of two and the only American to achieve this in the print category), and his 2016 portfolio resides in the PSA Permanent Print Collection. His photographic travels include trips to the Bahamas, Canadian Rockies, Churchill (Manitoba), Falkland Islands, Iceland, Italy, Namibia, Nova Scotia, Newfoundland, Patagonia, Scotland, and the Arizona desert. His presentations include slide shows such as "The Natural History of Loons", and lectures such as "Using Hue, Saturation, and Luminosity to Enhance a Three Dimensional Effect on a Two Dimensional Medium". For 4 years he has taught a course on "Composition and Visual Design", a 12 hour classroom and field workshop at GLPA. He has received numerous awards and acceptances in the camera club environment from the PSA, the NECCC, as well as the GLPA and several other organizations.

Mike Roman has been heavily involved in portrait photography for several decades. In 1998 he was selected to receive the prestigious honor of MNEC (Master Member) from the New England Camera Club Council. He became a camera club member in 1984 and has held just about every club office at one time or another. He has judged at the local and regional level for many years, and also for a number of international salons. Competing in salons, Michael has earned medals for Female and Child Portraits, Still Life, Nature, Abstract, and various Judge's Choice Awards. He has also taught photography, both professionally and in the camera club scene. An engineer by training, Michael also ran a portrait studio for many years. While he enjoys all types of photography, he is best known for his portrait work.

Ray Guillette has been involved in photography since childhood. He's a 38 year member, past president, and Honorary Life Member of the Stony Brook Camera Club, as well as an Honorary Life Member of PSRI. Ray is a Cofounder of the Film Photographers Association of Attleboro, MA. A Past President and Honorary Member of the NECCC, the 72nd NECCC Conference (2017) was dedicated to Ray. He's a well known international judge and exhibitor, and one of his greatest thrills in photography is getting lost in the creative process. He has produced and performed audiovisual shows for 33 years at camera and art clubs, including the Portland, ME and Newport, RI Museums of Art, the NYC Sierra Club, the Appalachian Mountain Club, and at photographic conventions from Maine to Florida and in Canada. He has presented 20 programs at the NECCC Conference. Ray has had an article and images published in the April 2007 issue of Popular Photography.

From the report submitted by the Spring NECCC Competition Coordinator Tara Marshall: "Three members came to my home the Saturday before the competition. It took five hours to unpack the mailers, write down entry numbers, sort and prepare for viewing. A BIG "Thank you!" goes out to Deb Page, Warren and Barbara Betkwith who gave so generously of their time."

The competition print viewing and judging was completed in one and a half hours.

"After the competition, Warren Beckwith and Deb Page, stayed to assist with recording scores on entry slips, preliminary report slips, and on the back of prints, packing up mailers, nd preparing for shipping. These activities took two hours to complete. I want to extend a special thanks to both of them for really going "above and beyond".

Observations:

Although the competition was completed in less than two hours, a number of issues created some difficulty in preparing for, and carrying what is normally a fairly straightforward event. Outlined below are the various "sticking points" encountered:

- *Some print cases / boxes were taped more than what is normally necessary to ensure safe print arrival. Near "mummification" does not equal careful packing.
- *Despite the new entry slip notice to complete both sides of the slip, three clubs neglected to do so.
- *Three clubs separated the preliminary report and entry slip sections. This should be left to the host club to do, to prevent one section from "going astray".
- *One club sent in their full allotment of four B&W and four color prints, accompanied by duplicate color entry slips... no black & white.
- *Six clubs did not log their B&W class in the space provided.
- *One club submitted a print that in no way came close to matching the title logged on the entry slip. Subject matter and title were clearly mismatched.
- *Despite the advice to print "clearly", for the print chairman to complete this report accurately, one scoring slip had to be examined under a binocular microscope at 40x with low-angle side lighting to provide positive "deciphering" of one critical word in the title. This actually took less time than calling the club rep responsible. Illegible printing on entry slips that are returned to me for using in generating my competition reports makes it necessary for me to visit club websites to ferret out the correct spelling of maker names, and browse club competition results for correct spelling of titles.

To eliminate the several hours of extra work sometimes required in dealing with entry slip issues, the decision has been made to eliminate paper slips altogether. Beginning with the 2018-2019 Interclub Print Competition season, the submission process will employ a form that will reside on the website, to be filled out much like a Conference Registration Form, downloadable for printing out after completion.

For the Spring 2017-2018 competition a total of 150 prints were submitted... 43 class "A" B&W, 29 class "B" B&W, and 78 Color. A total of 21 prints received awards... 6 class "A", 5 class "B" and 10 in Color.

The three top scoring clubs for this season are:

Black & White Class "A", 1st place - 280 points, Merrimack Valley Camera Club Black & White Class "B", 1st place - 272 points, Nashoba Valley Photo Club** Color, 1st place - 284 points, Flagpole Photographers **Moves up to Class "A" next year.



Inter-club Print of the Year Competition May 23, 2018

The NECCC Interclub Print of the Year competition for the 2017-2018 season was held on the evening of May 23rd at the Merrimack Valley Camera Club, 72 Church St, North Andover, MA. Of a total of 50 prints eligible for entry into the competition, 42 were submitted by their makers, a turnout of 84%. This is the fifth consecutive year that a level of better than 80% of print returns has been reached. In the past, when the Print of the Year Competition was held at the NECCC Conference, print submissions ran as low as 15%, with an average of 30% of eligible prints being returned for entry. Judges for this competition were Maureen Mathieson, MNEC, (a last minute volunteer standing in for a judge who was unexpectedly unable to attend), Todd Mathieson, MNEC, and Rajasekar Alamanda.

Todd and Maureen Mathieson are both past Presidents of the Assabet Valley Camera Club, and presently serve as Vice-Presidents and co-chairs of the NECCC Special Projects Division.

Rajasekar Alamanda is an award-winning light painting photographer, primarily focusing on automobiles and portraits. His work has been exhibited in the US and internationally. A member of PSA, his article "Light Painting... High Quality Car Photography on a Budget" appears in the May 2018 edition of the PSA Journal.

Unlike with the fall, winter, and spring interclub print competitions, class "A" and "B" monochrome were judged separately. Scoring was done using a five to ten points per judge scale, (15-30 total points possible). Each division's prints were previewed completely before judging began. As is usual in a competition where the prints submitted were already winners during the season, quality was very high, resulting in some tough decisions having to be made to arrive at "the best of the best". There were two-way tie top scores in black & white class "A" (28 pts), and class "B" (27 pts), so arriving at a Print of the Year in those divisions required "splitting a pair" of outstanding prints. In the Color division one print received 30 points, snagging the top award. The scoring range in B&W class A was 20 to 28 pts, in class B, 20-27 pts, and in Color, 20 to 30 pts. Second place (runner-up) awards were assigned for those prints that might possibly have won Print of the Year if the top award winner in each division had not been entered.


